

CHAPTER 74.

Of Public Processions.

1. It shall be lawful for the Governor at any time, when it shall appear to him that any public procession which is about to take place is likely to result in a breach of the peace, to issue a proclamation prohibiting such procession, which proclamation shall be published in the *Royal Gazette*.

2. Every person who, after the publication of such proclamation, shall walk in, or in any way take part in any procession referred to in such proclamation, shall, upon conviction before a stipendiary Magistrate, be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars, or imprisonment for a period not exceeding ten days.

3. Any person who shall feel himself aggrieved by any order or judgment of any stipendiary Magistrate, acting under the provisions of this chapter, may appeal to the then next sittings of the Supreme Court, either in St. John's or on Circuit, nearest to the place where such offence shall have been committed: Provided notice of such appeal be given to such Magistrate within two days after such order or judgment shall have been

made or given, and provided recognizance or other security satisfactory to such Magistrate be entered into within the same period for the prosecution of such appeal without delay, and for the payment of the penalty imposed in case such order or judgment be sustained, and all costs.

4. Any person imprisoned under the second section of this chapter who shall have given notice of appeal, as provided by the third section, may be admitted to bail pending such appeal upon recognizance for his surrender to the custody of the Sheriff of the district in which the alleged offence shall have been committed, at such time as shall be appointed by such Magistrate, and for the payment of the costs as well of the hearing before such Magistrate as of the said appeal: Provided such recognizance be satisfactory to such stipendiary Magistrate.
