

#### THURSDAY, 14th February, 1889.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY having, by several proclamations of His Excellency the Governor, hereto prefixed, been prorogued until this day; the members thereof met in the Assembly Room.

By virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal of this Island, to the Hon. E. D. Shea, President of the Legislative Council, and Hon. Sir R. Thorburn, member of the Executive Council, which is as follows:

T. O'BRIEN, Leut. Col. Governor. [L.S.] VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith.

To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:

KNOW YE that we have appointed, and by these presents do constitute and appoint the Honorables Edward Dalton Shea, President

of the Legislative Council, and ROBERT THORBURN, member of the Executive Council of the Island of Newfoundland, to be Commissioners, they or either of them to administer the oath of allegiance to DONALD-MORISON. Esq., who has been elected to serve in the General Assembly of our said Island, for the District of Bonavista, which said General Assembly has been appointed by Proclamation of our Governor of our said Island, to be holden at St. John's, on the 14th day of this instant month. Giving to them and either of them, our said Commissioners, full power and authority to perform the matters hereinbefore mentioned, ratifying and confirming all whatsoever they or either of them shall do and perform in this behalf, and thereof they or either of them are to make due return under their hands and seals, unto our Governor of our said Island, with these presents annexed.

The said Commissioners came between the hours of Twelve and One o'clock on the 14th inst., into the Council Chamber, RICHARD B. HOLDEN, Esq., Clerk of the General Assembly, as in duty bound. attending, when Donald Morison, Esq., returned member for the District of Bonavista, took and subscribed the oath of allegiance in presence of the said Commissioners.

And the said Donald Morison, Esq., took his seat for the said District accordingly.

A MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

At two o'clock a Message from His Excellency the Governor was delivered by W. F. Rennie, Esq., the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the immediate attendance of Mr. Speaker and the House in the Council Chamber.

And being returned to the Assembly Room.

Hon. the Speaker informed the House that, when in attendance on His Excellency in the Council Chamber, His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both branches of the Legislature, of which, to prevent mistakes, he had procured a copy, and which he read to the House, as follows,—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

It affords me great pleasure to meet you for the first time since my assumption of the Government of this Colony, for the purpose of co-operating with you in the conduct of its public affairs; I take this opportunity of assuring you of my earnest desire to assist to the utmost of my ability in the promotion of the best interests of Newfoundland and its people, and efficiently and satisfactorily to discharge the responsible duties of my office.

I am glad to be able to say that the results of the industrial operations of the past year have been, on the whole, successful.

The seal fishery, including a good shore catch in Notre Dame Bay, yielded, on the whole, a somewhat short return.

The shore cod fishery was in many places short, and, on the whole, below the average. That of Labrador shewed an improvement upon the previous year; and the Bank fishery, though not yielding as large an average catch to each vessel as that of 1887, was carried on

upon a larger scale, and with an increased total result. Good prices contributed largely to enhance the value of the returns, against which, however, it is to be regretted, that a large depreciation resulted from defective cure, occasioned principally by bad weather during the latter months of the year.

The salmon fishery was below the average as to catch, but realized good prices.

The herring fishery at Labrador was a failure, but, upon the coast was unusually good, and, the fish taken were of exceptionally large size and good quality.

The lobster fishery was prosecuted upon a still increasing scale, though with not as profitable results as in the preceding years.

Agricultural operations were, on the whole, attended with a large measure of success, and I am glad to be able to state that, under the influence of the encouragement afforded by recent legislation, and especially by the increased bonus for the clearing of land for cultivation, authorized by the Act of last session, the interest in agriculture has, during the past year, continued to advance, and that the prospects of the further development of this valuable industry in the future are hopeful.

The activity in mining, which received a fresh impulse in 1887, has continued.

Ship-building has been carried on upon a large scale, having, no doubt, been stimulated by the temporary additional bounty offered in the end of 1887, and confirmed by the Act of last session. This measure has in a high degree accomplished its two-fold object, in providing remunerative employment for the needy at a time of depression, and in the addition of a large number of vessels of a superior class to our sailing fleet, particularly to those employed in the prosecution of the Bank-fishery.

In the early part of last year my predecessor, having become convinced of a growing disposition, on the part of many of the people, to rely upon aid from the Government from year to year, in employment upon public works, and in other forms, deemed it necessary to issue a proclamation, calling public attention to the pernicious effects and tendencies of this practice, and declaring that, in future, monies voted by the Legislature for public improvements, would not be made subservient to purposes of relief. I am glad to learn that salutary results have already followed from the issue of this proclamation.

The enforcement of the Act for the prohibition of the export of Bait fishes, has engaged the constant attention of the Government, and has been attended with such a measure of success in its effect upon competition from our rivals in our principal foreign markets, as fully to demonstrate the wisdom and value of the measure. You will, doubtless, recognise the necessity for maintaining the position which has been taken in relation to this important measure, so long as the causes, which led to its adoption, continues to exist.

Acting upon the authority given by you during last session, the Government during the latter months of the year 1888, inaugurated a system of communication by the employment of two steamers in certain of the Northern and Western Bays. These services have proved of great public convenience, and it will be for you to determine to what extent provision can be made for their continuance upon a permanent footing.

The construction of the line of Railway to Placentia has been completed to within a short distance of the Placentia terminus, where the erection of a small pier is all that is now wanting to establish the connection with the waters of Placentia Bay. The line, as far as completed, has been in regular, though limited, operation since Nevember, and the traffic upon it has already been such as to establish, beyond doubt, the future value and general public utility of the enterprise.

I am pleased to be able to state, that the result of the first financial operation of the Colony in London, in placing upon its market the loans authorised by the Acts of last session, has been highly satisfactory, both as regards the terms upon which the loan was effected,

and as proof of the confidence of the best authorities on financial matters, in the credit of the Colony.

At the International Exhibition, held at Barcelona during the past summer, this Colony was officially represented by the Receiver-General as its Commissioner, and a large number and variety of the products of the Colony were sent for exhibition. It is pleasing to learn that these exhibits attracted much attention, and that their general high standard of excellence was attested by the large number of prizes awarded them in the various departments. There is reason to hope that this creditable shewing on the part of the Colony, will have a good effect upon our commercial relations with other countries.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I am glad to be able to say, that the estimate of revenue for the past year has been fully realized. The public accounts, and estimates, will be laid before you in due course, and, I feel assured that you will make due provisions for the requirements of the various departments of the public service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

The treaty signed at Washington in February last, between Her-Majesty and the President of the United States, in relation to fishery questions, having failed to obtain the satisfaction of the United States Senate necessary to give it effect, the Colony must revert to the position which it occupied previous to these negotiations, and continue to assert its rights, until some satisfactory adjustment of the questions in dispute shall have been arrived at.

The failure on the part of the Newfoundland Railway Company in their undertaking to build and operate the line of Railway to Hall's. Bay, imposes upon us the duty of determining the course of erection to be taken in relation to the completion of the work. While this failure must necessarily create difficulties in the carrying out of the original.

project, the great importance of the undertaking, in its bearing upon the future interests of the Colony, calls for your most careful consideration in view of the altered circumstances under which the subject now presents itself, and the many and serious questions involved. I have no doubt that in desiring plans for the continuance of the work, you will be guided by a careful regard for the financial interests and public credit of the Colony.

The Government will, during the session, lay before you information in connection with this important matter, which will be of material value in assisting you in your deliberations.

The important subject of the preservation and improvement of our fishing industries, will again be brought under your consideration. During the recess, the Government have taken an important step in relation to the permanent establishment of fish hatcheries, in which they have been supported by strong representations and material pecuniary guarantees from those most largely interested in the fisheries of this Colony. To provide for efficient direction of this project, will add to the necessity, already so largely recognised, for the appointment, upon a permanent footing, of a bureau or other deliberative body, whose function it will be to apply the result of study and experience to many and difficult questions of growing importance in counection with our fisheries and fishing industries. You will, I am sure, give your best attention to this most vital subject.

The subject of the application of the elective principle to the management of local affairs throughout this Colony is one which during the session, you will be asked to consider. I trust that your deliberations upon this important, but difficult, subject will result in the adoption of such a measure as will be adapted in its working to the varied circumstances of the different localities. I trust that in all your deliberations you may be assisted by Divine guidance, to wise and beneficent conclusions.

On motion of Mr. Carty, seconded by Mr. Rolls,

The Select Committee appointed during last session to revise the report of the Consolidation of the Statute Law, beg to report that they have devoted their best attention to the work entrusted to them, and have made a careful revision of the draft prepared by the Commission. The work requires but a few days for its completion, and your Committee respectfully request that their functions may be continued for that purpose.

Receiver General to lay on the table a statement of the gross amount expended on the Placentia Railway to date, the number of miles up to grade and fully ballasted, the value of rolling and other stock included in the stated expenditure, a copy of the agreement between the Government Engineer and Mr. Laird, for the erection of the Railway buildings near Placentia, and an estimate of the amount required to fully complete and equip the road down to Placentia.

Also, to ask Hon. Receiver General to lay on the table a statement of the gross revenue and expenditure for the year 1888.

## MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

We, the Commons House of Assembly of Newfoundland, in Legislative Session convened, beg to thank your Excellency for the gracious Speech with which you have opened this session of the present General Assembly.

We cordially reciprocate the pleasure expressed by your Excellency in meeting and co-operating with the Legislature in the conduct of public affairs. We accord to you an appreciative welcome, and we feel assured that your distinguished career in the past is a pledge and earnest of your efficient administration of the government of this Colony.

It is gratifying to us to note the general success of the industrial operations of the Colony during the past year: but it is a matter of regret that, although the seal fishery in Notre Dame Bay was attended

with comparative success, the results of this industry were, on the whole, unsatisfactory.

With your Excellency, we have to regret the decline in the results of the Shore codfishery, but we have to recognize the improvement in the fishery at Labrador, and the increasing enterprise displayed, and the increased capital invested in the important industry of the Bank fishery. It is satisfactory to know that our staple produce has commanded good prices in foreign markets, and it is much to be desired that greater attention to the cure of our Labrador fish should enable us to complete successfully with our foreign rivals in foreign markets.

We are pleased to note the general results of the salmon, herring and lobster fisheries, and though the herring fishery at Labrador was not attended with success it is satisfactory to consider that this failare was in a measure compensated by the large quantity and superior quality of the fish taken upon the coast.

It is to us, as to your Excellency, a matter of special congratulation that Agricultural enterprise has been liberally rewarded during the past year. We cannot doubt but that the general success of this industry, so far as the extension of cultivation is concerned, is attributable to the stimulus imparted by recent legislation, and we share your Excellency's belief and hope as to the future extension and success of Agricultural operations.

The revived activity of mining enterprise we regard as fraught with great interest to the future of the Colony.

The stimulation afforded to the shipbuilding industry by the additional bounty appropriated by the Act of last session has been attended by the happy results which were anticipated as well in the affording of labour to those who would otherwise be condemned to enforced idleness, as in the addition to our sailing fleet of a higher grade of vessels than those that have been heretofore constructed.

We are in complete accord with your Excellency in recognising the necessity and the effectiveness of the proclamation issued by your distinguished predecessor, in reference to relief works and aid to the able-bodied poor; and we do not doubt that if a spirit of self-reliance be enforced upon our people, results, the most salutary, will necessarily ensue.

We concur with your Excellency as to the wisdom of the policy which led to the enactment of the measure for the prohibition of the export of Bait fishes, and it must be a matter of congratulation to us that the effective carrying out of this measure has enabled us to compete upon more favorable terms with other countries in fish markets abroad.

The extension of steam communication in the Northern and Western Bays, is of the greatest advantage to the trade of this Colony and to the travelling public. We are pleased to find that the experiment already made in this direction has proved successful, and it shall be our duty to give careful consideration to the possible establishment of this service upon a permanent and effective basis.

It is satisfactory to know that the operation of the Railway to Placentia, now almost completed, has been attended with such satisfactory results as to warrant an assurance of its future value and general public utility.

We cannot but regard with pride and satisfaction the fact that the Loan upon the credit of this Colony, which was obtained in London during the past year, was raised upon terms so favorable to the finances and to the credit of the Colony.

The success of our Exhibits at the Barcelona Exhibition, at which the Colony was represented by the Receiver General, is extremely gratifying, and we unite with your Excellency in the hope that this exposition of our resources may operate favorably towards the development of our foreign trade.

We regard with pleasure the fact that the Revenue of the Colony for the past year has reached the estimate. We thank your Excellency for the promise of the public accounts and estimates, and it shall be our care and duty to make adequate provision for the requirements of Her Majesty's service.

We recognize that the failure of the United States Senate to ratify the Treaty of Washington, signed in February of last year, relegates the Colony to the position which it occupied previous to the attempted adjustment of international difficulties, and constrains us to make vigorous assertion and rigorous enforcement of our Colonial rights.

The action to be taken by the Colony in reference to the completion of the line of railway to Hall's Bay, is a subject which demands the serious consideration of the House. The failure of the Newfoundland Railway Company in the performance of their contract, has imposed upon the Legislature a task of no ordinary difficulty, having regard, on the one side, to the magnitude and importance of the work, and, upon the other side, to the financial interests and public credit of the Colony. We thank your Excellency for the assurance that material information on this matter will be laid before us by your Excellency's Government, and we pledge ourselves to give the whole subject that serious consideration which its supreme importance demands.

We fully appreciate the wisdom of the Government in taking definite action in relation to the establishment of fish-hatcheries, and the scientific examination of matters pertaining to our chief industry. In this behalf we have pleasure in noting that the Government have been encouraged by the sympathy and substantial assistance of those whose interests are involved in the Fisheries of the country. We are persuaded that the establishment of a Bureau or Department of Fisheries upon the lines suggested by your Excellency, would be attended with the most beneficial results. This matter will be the subject of our earnest deliberation, with a view to some definite action therein.

The principle of an elective local self-government is a subject

which, though fraught with difficulties as to its machinery and details, is one which commends itself to our serious attention, and, we trust that our deliberations upon this matter may result in the framing and adoption of a measure at once comprehensive and effective.

We join your Excellency in the hope that the All-wise Ruler of events may guide our deliberations to wards the promotion of the best interests of the Colony.

On motion that the report be received,

Mr. Bond moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Murphy, that the tenth paragraph of the Address be stricken out, and the following inserted in lieu thereof:

"We concur with your Excellency as to the wisdom and necessity of protecting and preserving our Bait fishes, but we fear that the Act passed by the Legislature in 1887, entitled 'An Act for the preservation of our Bait fishes,' has operated to the serious pecuniary loss of a large number of the fishermen, heretofore engaged in the Bait traffic, and owning considerable property, which, by the restrictions of the said Act, has been rendered comparatively valueless. We, therefore, trust that measures will be adopted, during the present session, to investigate and report as to the loss sustained by the enforcement of the said Act, with a view to compensating those who shall be shewn to have suffered by the operation of the said Act."

Also, that he will, on to-morrow, ask the Hon. the Premier whether it is the intention of the Government to procure a report from the Chairman of the Board of Health of St. John's, and if so, at what time this House may expect a copy of the same.

Also, that he will, on to-morrow, ask the Hon. the Premier for a copy of all correspondence between the St. John's Board of Health, or the Chairman thereof, and the Government, from September last past, to first of March instant; also, whether any rules, regulations or instructions have been furnished by the Government to said Board of Health, for its guidance, and if so, for a copy of the same, and also, as to what measures the Government have adopted, or intend to adopt, to stamp out the Diptheria now raging in our midst.

Ordered,-That the House at its rising, do adjourn until Thursday next.

To the Honorable the House of Assembly of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, in Legislative Session convened.

The Petition of Henry A. Clift, of Harbor Grace, in the Northern District, Barrister-at-Law, humbly sheweth,—

That your Petitioner, approaching your Honorable House with feelings of the greatest respect, begs, in the interest of the safety and welfare of the people, and the cause of weather, epidemical and sanitary science, to bring under the notice of your Honorable House the vast importance of some provision or grant, to help the furnishing of practical statistics, and information on these matters, together with the furnishing of vital statistics of health, disease and epidemic, to the end that the state of the people on these heads may be, from time to time, known, and that all order may be taken to obtain certain information with reference to the climate of this Colony internal as well as external,

And furthermore, to conduce to the safety and welfare of our seagoing population, as will the business of Agriculture.

That it is plain that the people of Newfoundland cannot now almost wholly depend upon the fisheries for support, a fact which is so self-evident as to be axiomatic even by Euclid, and a fact which, sad to say, has brought us almost from the genesis of the Colony to its exodus—a fact too which, if allowed any future and further way and power, will next thing depopulate the Island—the Newfoundland of our common affection and common prayer.

That, without being at all dictatorial, your petitioner is in it being a part of hermeneutics to remedy this untoward state. And, indeed, your Honorable House has, in a most enlightened manner, energized railways as the great veins of the country, to promote and assist agriculture, mining, lumbering, etc., as, also, a system of roads. The effect of all which is an increased settling on the land, which so pleased your Petitioner on a late visit to the H. G. Junction, Dildo, etc., that your Petitioner most respectfully apprehends that, for the encouragement of at least a limited emigration of well-informed people from other countries, it is needful interalia to obtain data of the internal climate of the agricultural lands of the Colony, internal, so as to be a future guide and conduce to such emigration of well-informed people, who would ensample our people in agriculture, and so promote their slow but sure resurrection from the present grave to a better life.

That your Petitioner notices the formation of a fishery Bureau—a most important factor for the people's benefit. He begs most respectfully that a weather Bureau should be combined with that, and, in order to make a commencement, he respectfully suggests that the sea light-keepers would be required, at a small extra compensation, to afford a maintained and practical information of weather in the interest of maratime safety.

That by the long experience of your Petitioner, it is absolutely necessary for us to use our own brains and our own observation about

our own weather, and we must not hunt in the almanacks, or newspapers, or prophets of other countries.

That it is a glorious principle of science that it will work whether rewarded or not rewarded, otherwise, there would be small work done.

Petitioner, therefore, discards any personal idea, and prays for consideration of these matters by your Honorable House, for the steady progress of Newfoundland, and the welfare of the people and their children. And as in duty he will ever pray, etc.

A MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

The Hon. the PREMIER presented to the House the following written message, from His Excellency, which was read, and is as follows:—

T. O'BRIEN, Lt. Col., Govern

The Governor begs to acknowledge the Address of the House of Assembly, dated 1st March, and received by him yesterday, request-

ing that they be supplied with copies of all correspondence that has taken place relative to the alleged removal of a Lobster Factory, at Hauling Point, White Bay, by a French war ship.

He has to inform the gentlemen of the House of Assembly, that, as the correspondence is incomplete and mostly of a confidential nature, he regrets he is not in a position to furnish the information sought; he, however, trusts that, as this forms part of the whole question of the so-called "French Shore," which would appear to be now prominently under the consideration of the two Home Governments, ere long definite information on this point will be at your disposal.

He may however observe, that, from the correspondence received up to now, it would seem that this question and your interests have not been lost sight of by the Colonial or Foreign Office, and that it is still under reference.

The Governor would also beg to point out that there would appear to be an error in the Address under reply, for he believes that the owner was a Mr. Murphy, if so he finds that this gentleman was desired to remove his Factory, not by a French war ship, but by Lieutenant Bearcroft, Commander of Her Majesty's gun-boat Forward, which vessel was last year one of those sent by the Home Government to protect your Fisheries.

The Governor has not failed to impress on the Secretary of State the great anxiety felt by the inhabitants of Newfoundland for an early solution of this difficulty.

Ordered,—That the said Bills do pass, and be entitled respectively, "An Act to amend the laws, in force in this Island, for the prevention of the sale of Intoxicating Liquors."

And, "An Act to amend and consolidate the laws relating to the prevention of cruelty to animals."

Ordered,—That the said Bills be sent to the Legislative Council for concurrence.

Mr. Carry submitted the following resolutions, to be laid before the Committee of the whole House, on the subject of British rights and French claims on that part of the coast of Newfoundland on which the French have a temporary right of fishery:—

Whereas, claims have been recently made by French subjects asserting their right to take lobsters and salmon upon those portions

of the coast of this Island upon which certain temporary rights of Fishery have been by Treaty conceded to the French; and subjects of France have with the approval and assistance of French Warships compelled the removal of establishments erected by British subjects for the purpose of taking and preserving lobsters and salmon, which claims and interference will have a necessary tendency to lead to enmity, quarrels and bloodshed, between the subjects of the two nations.

And Whereas, by reason of such claims and interference, much damage and loss has occurred to British subjects, many of whom have been thereby deprived of the means of subsistence for their families.

And Whereas, in violation of the 13th Article of the Treaty of Utrecht, the French have presumed to erect upon the coasts of this Island, certain permanant establishments and buildings, with plant and appliances for the purpose of taking and preserving lobsters, some of which establishments and buildings have been now for a period of upwards of two years unremoved and unmolested, and further encroachments in this direction have been threatened.

And Whereas, by the interference of the French authorities and their prohibition of the Mining operations of British subjects on the said coasts, Mining enterprise has been hampered, much capital already expended has been wasted, and our people have thereby been deprived of much remunerative employment, whilst valuable mineral resources have necessarily remained undeveloped.

Resolved,—That it is the opinion of this Committee, that the claims on the part of the French to take lobsters or salmon on any portion of the coasts of this Island are utterly without foundation, and cannot be maintained for the reasons well set forth by the Hon. Mr. Justice Pinsent, D. C. L., in his charge to the Grand Jury of Bonne Bay, in September of 1887, which were as follows:—

1—Because it was declared by the "Treaty of Utrecht," that it should be unlawful for the French to erect buildings except those "necessary and usual for drying of Fish."

- 2—Because the "Treaty of Paris," 1763, restricted the liberty to "fishing and drying."
- 3—Because the Treaty of Versailles, 1783, speaks of "the fishery assigned to them by the Treaty of Utrecht."
- 4—Because the "Declaration," speaks of "The Fishery," and that "the method of carrying on the fishery which has at all times been acknowledged, shall be the plan upon which the fishery shall be carried on there."
- 5—Because the French King's "Counter Declaration," speaks of "the fishery on the coasts of Newfoundland which has been the object of the new arrangements."
- 6—Because the "Treaty of Paris," 1814, declares that the French right of fishery "shall be replaced upon the footing in which it stood in 1792."

And further, Because there was no such industry as a lobster fishery in Newfoundland at any of these periods, and no such thing as a lobster fishery heard of, until within a few years past, and the language used to describe "the fishery," which the French were entitled to pursue, is utterly in applicable to lobster-catching, or to the erection of factories for taking or canning lobsters.

Resolved,—That it is the opinion of this Committee that the removal, by the French authorities, of the establishments of British subjects, erected upon the said coasts for the purpose of taking and preserving lobsters, is, on the part of the French authorities, a violation of Treaty obligations and of international law, and a gross trespass upon the rights of British subjects, and one for which compensation should be demanded from the Government of France.

Resolved,—That this Committee consider that the unlawful erection, by French subjects, of permanent establishments and erections upon the said coast, in encroachment upon the rights of British subjects, and in usurpation of claims not conceded by Treaty, demands

a firm but temperate expression of our opinion as to the relative rights of the subjects of the two nations upon the said coasts, and the necessity for remedying, by remonstrance and by negotiations between the two great Powers, the injustice to which such French interference has exposed the subjects of Her Majesty in this Island.

Resolved,—That it is the opinion of this Committee that such remonstrance and negotiations should also have regard to the territorial rights of Her Majesty in, and over, the said coasts and waters, and the undue and unreasonable interference, which has checked the course of mining enterprise, and retarded the progress of lumbering and agricultural industries.

Resolved,—That it is the opinion of this Committee that a humble address be forwarded to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, setting forth the facts and reasons contained in the foregoing resolutions, and praying that such action may be taken in the premises, as may conserve the rights of Her Majesty's subjects in this Island, and repair them in the damages which they have heretofore sustained.

Ordered,—That Mr. Carty's notice of motion, for Committee of the Whole, be deferred until Tuesday next, the 26th instant, and to stand first on the order of the day.

Bread and biscuit of the kind called and known as hard ship's biscuit, per cwt., 20 cents.

Bread and biscuit all other kinds, 20 per cent ad valorem.

Steam engines and boilers, propellers, water wheels and saws, 10 per cent ad valorem.

Resolved,—That the Table of Exemptions be amended by striking therefrom—

Steam engines, boilers, propellers, water wheels and saws, when used in the original construction of steam-boats built in this Colony, and of mills and factories.

A petition from W. H. Whiteley, James Murray, John Curran, Walter Veale, James Baird, R. L. Mare, K. R. Prowse, and others, citizens of St. John's, has been presented to this House, praying that certain amendments be made in said Act;

#### Resolved,-

- 1.—That it is the opinion of this committee that the said Act be amended.
- 2.—The number of members of the St. John's Municipal Council shall be ten, two members for each of the existing wards to be elected by the rate-payers of St. John's annually, in the month of February in each year on a day to be fixed by the Governor in Council.
- 3.—The next election of members of the said Council shall take place in the month of February, A.D., 1890.
- 4.—Any member of the Council who shall be absent from the colony for a period of six calendar months continuously, shall cease to be a member of the Council.
- 5.—A member whose seat shall have become vacant by reason of his insolvency shall, notwithstanding his obtaining a certificate of insolvency and final discharge, be ineligible during the term of the Council within which his seat so became vacant.
- 6.—All words from and including the word "Provided," on the ninth line of section eight of said Act be stricken thereout.
- 7.—A member of the Legislature shall not be eligible to be elected or shall sit or vote as a member of the said Council.
- 8.—Every British subject of the age of 21 years of age and upwards who has for a period of one year next preceding the election resided in St. John's ,been liable to, and actually paid, rates and assessments under the Acts relating to the General Water Company, and to the sewerage of the Town of St. John's, or having resided in Saint John's for one year previous to such election, and is not liable for any other Municipal tax, shall pay a poll tax of one dollar per annum, shall be deemed to be a rate-payer under said Act: Provided, that no person not otherwise qualified shall be entitled or allowed to vote at such election unless he shall have, at least two months previous thereto paid such poll tax.

- 9.—The rules and regulations which may be made under subsection, 1, section 27 of said Act shall be published in all the Saint Jehn's newspapers.
- 10.—The St. John's Municipal Council shall have power to purchase and acquire a piece or parcel of land belonging to the Estate of late C. F. Bennett and adjoining the lands dedicated by said Act for a park at River Head, and to add the same to the said park for the purposes thereof, and to make the necessary expenditure for such purposes, and to raise the money therefor by
- 11.—The Chairman of the said Council shall be elected by the Council on the first meeting after their Election every year, and shall hold office until the next general election of Councillors, unless his seat in the Council shall have become vacant, or until his removal by a vote of a majority of the Councillors present at a meeting convened for the purpose of considering and voting upon such removal. Upon a vacancy so occurring in the office of Chairman, the Council shall elect a new Chairman; in case of a tie at such election, the temporary Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.
- 12.—The Municipal Council shall have power to appoint all such officers and servants as may be necessary for effectually carrying out the provisions of the Act, and to fix the salaries of such officers and servants. All officers and servants shall hold office during the pleasure of the Council, and no official appointment shall extend beyond one month of the term of election of the Municipal Council which makes such appointment.
- 13.—All contracts or agreements of or with the Council shall be made in the name of the Chairman, and signed by him, or by the Secretary, at his direction.
  - 14.—Any six members of the Council shall be a quorum.
- 15.—In Section 46 of said Act, the words "one thousand five hundred dollars" shall be stricken out, and the words "two thousand and one hundred dollars" inserted instead thereof.

- 16.—The Municipal Council be empowered to raise a loan to pay off the loan of \$607,000 raised or to be raised under said Act.
- 17.—The sum of fifty-five thousand dollars which, by the said Act was made payable out of the Loan of six hundred and seven thousand dollars for certain purposes, shall be transferred to the said Council, and applied in addition to the one hundred thousand dollars by said Act provided therefor, to the carrying out of an improved and effective system of Sewerage in St. John's.
- 18.—The Municipal Council shall have power to impose and collect such rates and assessments on property or otherwise as are necessary for carrying out the purposes of said Act, as follows:
  - (1) The rates and assessments now imposed and collected under the several Acts relating to the General Water Company, to the Sewerage of the town of St. John's and to the St. John's Fire Brigade, which shall be collected by and form part of the funds of the Council.
  - (2) A poll tax of one dollar to be paid by every male person between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, provided he is subject to or liable for no other tax, levied or collected under this Act; no legal proceedings shall be taken for recovery of such poll tax. The words "and such further amounts," and the words that follow in section 53 of said Act, shall be stricken out.
- 19.—The Council shall, every year, furnish to the ratepayers at a public meeting to be convened for that purpose, on or before the tenth day of February, full and detailed account of receipts from all sources, and expenditures upon all services and purposes, and a Committee of Audit, chosen at and by a majority vote of said meeting, to examine and verify the accounts for the past year, which Committee of Audit shall report at a second public meeting, to be convened by them for that purpose, on or before the 31st day of January, inst. The Committee shall be paid for their services, and all necessary expenses, out of the funds at the disposal of the Municipal Council, and copies of

the accounts as presented at the annual meeting, published in all the St. John's newspapers. The accounts made up as aforesaid shall be furnished to the Governor in Council, and laid before the Legislature as its nearest session.

- 20.—That in all arbitrations under said Act, and the Acts therein incorporated, the Council shall appoint one arbitrator, and the person whose interests are effected shall appoint another arbitrator, and the two arbitrators so appointed shall choose an umpire, before commencing such arbitration.
- 21.—The rules and regulations made by the Council, in pursuance of said Act, shall be published in all the St. John's newspapers.
- 22.—All material imported into this Colony for Municipal purposes shall be admitted duty free.
- 23.—No pensions shall be granted an any Municipal Officer or servant out of the fund of the Council.
- 24.—For the valuation of property subject to taxation under this Act, a sworn Appraiser shall be appointed, whose duty it shall be to personally visit and inspect all buildings and other property within the bounds of the Municipality, and value the same. The valuation for taxing purposes shall be the market value of the property as nearly as can be ascertained, but less an allowance or abatement of ten per cent off the same. The books of appraisement shall be open to the inspection of the public at the Appraiser's office during the month of November in every year. During the month of December in every year the said books of appraisement shall be deposited in the Magistrates' Court for revision and repeal in the usual way, as heretofore. The fact that the books of appraisement are open as aforesaid for inspection and revision shall be published in all the local papers during these two months; and a written notice of the assessed value of his property shall be sent to and served upon every individual owner or occupant of property, or his authorised agent, at least one clear week before the closing of the revision.

25.—(New section)—The Municipal year shall begin on the first day of March, and end on the last day of February, in each year.

26.—New section—A suitable oath of office shall be administered by a Justice of the Peace to all Municipal Councillors on assuming the duties of their office.

Resolved,—That the Committee rise and report the evidence and these Resolutions to the House.

Ordered,-That this report be received.

Ordered,—That evidence accompanying the above report, together with the Resolution, be printed and published forthwith in a special edition of the *Evening Mercury*.

#### FRIDAY, 17th May, 1889.

Hon. Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the Committee that they had considered the Resolutions to them referred, and had passed the same without amendment, and he handed in the said Resolutions at the Clerk's table, where they were read, and are as follows:—

WHEREAS, in the year 1881, a contract was entered into and ratified by the Legislature between the Government of the colony and the Newfoundland Railway Company, under which the said Company undertook to construct, within five years from the date of the contract, and to operate, for the period of thirty-five years, a line of railway between St. John's and Hall's Bay, with branch lines to Harbor Grace and Clarke's Beach—in all, about 340 miles of railway—in consideration of an annual cash subsidy from the funds of the Colony, and certain grants of land;

And whereas, the said Company have failed in the performance of their contract, and have constructed and operated only a portion of the line contracted for, viz., from St. John's to Harbor Grace, a distance of about 85 miles, and have no intention of proceeding further with the construction of said line;

And whereas, the Government have invited tenders for a contract to build and operate the uncompleted portion of said line, to which a small number of supplies only have been received;

And whereas, after having given the most careful consideration

to the said several tenders, the Government consider that, on account of the absence from the colony of the parties tendering, of the want of necessary information in detail in relation to the probable cost of the contemplated work and other conditions incident to its being carried forward, they cannot recommend the acceptance and legislative adoption, during the present session, of any of the said tenders;

#### Therefore Resolved,—

- 1.—That in the opinion of this Committee, it is desirable that the construction of the line of railway to Hall's Bay and branch lines, as contemplated by the said contract of 1881, be proceeded with forthwith.
- 2.—That the line or route of said Railway shall conform generally to that laid down in the said Act and contract of 1881, with such minor modifications along the route as after examination and survey may be found desirable.
- 3.—That in the opinion of this Committee it is desirable that the work of constructing the line to Hall's Bay, should extend over a period of ten years, and that the line should be built at an average rate of about 25 miles per annum.
- 4.—That provision be made by this Legislature for raising the money necessary for the carrying out of the said work.
- 5.—That authority be taken to raise by loan upon the credit of the Colony, to be expended upon said work, a sum of not exceeding \$4,250,000 in ten annual amounts of not exceeding \$425,000 each.
- 6.—That arrangements be made for a full and complete survey of the proposed line from Harbor Grace Junction to Hall's Bay during the ensuing summer.
- 7.—That, upon such survey and a full and complete specification of the required work, tenders for the construction and operation of the line, and for each service separately, be invited by the Government, to be laid before the Legislature at next session for such action thereupon as may then be determined.

- 8.—That in the meantime the work of construction of said line be commenced forthwith, under the direction and control of commissioners appointed by the Governor in Council, and continued under such management unless or until the Legislature shall determine to adopt a contract for the further continuance and completion of the work.
- 9.—That a Bill be introduced embodying the foregoing resolutions, and containing such provisions as may be necessary for giving full effect to the objects therein set forth.

On motion that this report be received, it was moved in ameudment thereof by Mr. Bond, seconded by Mr. Murphy, that the following be substituted therefor:—

WHEREAS, in the year 1881, a contract was entered into and ratified by the Legislature between the Government of the Colony and the Newfoundland Railway Company, under which the said Company undertook to construct, within five years from the date of the contract, and to operate, for a period of thirty-five years, a line of railway between St. John's and Hall's Bay, with branch lines to Harbor Grace and Clarke's Beach—in all, about 340 miles of railway—in consideration of an annual cash subsidy from the funds of the Colony, and certain grants of land;

And whereas, the said Company have failed in the performance of their contract, and have constructed and operated only a portion of the line contracted for, viz: from St. John's to Harbor Grace, a distance of about 85 miles, and a suit at law has been instituted against the said Company for the recovery of damages for the alleged breach of contract, which suit is still pending in the Supreme Court;

And whereas, the Government have invited tenders for a contract to build and operate the uncompleted portion of said line, which tenders were solicited by the Government, not with a view to the contracting for the actual construction of a railroad to Hall's Bay, but for the purpose of obtaining evidence wherewith to sustain the said suit against the Company;

And whereas, after careful consideration of the several tenders, and of the information which was afforded the parties concerned, prior to their tendering, it appears to this Committee to have been impossible for them to make any tender upon an intelligent financial basis;

And whereas, it would be highly detrimental to the financial stability of the Colony that a work of such magnitude as that of the construction of the railroad contemplated, should be entered upon until full and definite information is laid before the Legislature, and that when such information is obtained, it is the opinion of the Committee that the work of construction and operating of the road should be performed by a Company upon an annual subsidy;

And whereas, the resulting advantages to the Colony will be slow in development, and the returns consequent upon the operation of the contemplated railway very much minimized, unless in connection with a scheme for the construction of a line of railway a well considered plan for settling the agricultural lands through which the road shall run be organized and determined upon;

Resolved,—That this Committee is of opinion that a survey should be commenced forthwith, and that measures be at once adopted for the obtaining of tenders for the construction and operation of a line of railroad between Harbor Grace Junction and Hall's Bay, by a Company upon an annual subsidy.

Resolved,—That it is the opinion of this Committee that the Government should prepare and submit to the Legislature a scheme for the settlement of the valuable lands through which the proposed railroad will run, to be adopted simultaneously with the contract for the construction of the railroad and to operate concurrently therewith.

It appears that the office could not be regarded as one to which the petitioner could by precedent or authority have been appointed for any longer period than the then ensuing year, but in the course of his examination before the Committee, Mr. Barnes stated that when he accepted the office he was assured by the then Executive that the appointment was a permanent one, and that, relying upon this assurance, he had refused to accept other permanent offices connected with the public service. The Committee then thought it desirable to enquire from members of the Executive of that day: James L. Noonan, Esq., now H. M. Assistant Collector of Customs, and the

Hon. Mr. Justice Little, one of the Assistant Judges of the Supreme Court, as to the intention and object of Mr. Barnes' appointment. These gentlemen state that His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive of the day, was clearly of opinion that the office to which Mr. Barnes was then appointed was of a permanent character, and of that class of offices which the incumbent could hold during good behaviour.

The Committee append hereto the evidence of Mr. Barnes, and the replies from Mr. Noonan and Mr. Justice Little, hereinbefore referred to.

This being so, the Committee are of opinion that Mr. Barnes accepted the office under the belief that it would be of the class of office referred to and claimed by him. and, although the Committee do not deny the right of the Government to dismiss from office any official; yet it is usually considered that no incumbent of any office, not of a temporary nature, ought to be discharged without cause.

The Committee consider that Mr. Barnes was undoubtedly misled by his Excellency's advisers in accepting an office to which they had no power to appoint him in the manner and form aforesaid.

Mr. Barnes has received from time to time certain sums from the Government, amounting to about \$800, but your Committee having considered the equties of Mr. Barnes' claim, are clearly of opinion that the office of which he was deprived was bona fide given by the Government and accepted by him as a permanent official position. Having been thus misled and deprived of the office from no fault of his own, the Committee respectfully submit that Mr. Barnes is entitled to some adequate compensation, which they estimate and report should be not less than one thousand dollars, in full discharge of all claims of Mr. Barnes upon the Government of Newfoundland.

The Select Joint Committee of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, appointed for the purpose of considering the subject of

British rights and French claims on that part of the coast of Newfoundland, on which the French have fishery privileges, report that they have arrived at certain conclusions, which are embodied in the following Report and Resolutions:

The Committee have had submitted to them the correspondence in reference to the interference with the rights of Messieurs Murphy and Andrews, British subjects, in the prosecution of their business as Lobster Packers at Hauling Point, in White Bay, during the Fishery Season of 1888.

This correspondence comprehends not only the statement and claim of Messieurs Murphy and Andrews, but, also the collateral correspondence of His Excellency the Governor and the Imperial authorities; all of which, as laid before the Committee, is appended hereto as a portion of this Report.

In connection with this, the Committee have had occasion to consider the action of the Legislature in previous sessions, and the assurances of the Imperial Government as given, from time to time, in confirmation of positions asserted and maintained by the Colony in respect of the relative rights of British and French subjects, under Treaties between the two great Powers.

The Committee, in their present deliberations, have been constrained to regard as a prominent cause of difficulty, the new claims now attempted to be put forward by the French, which, in the case of Messieurs Murphy and Andrews, seem to involve the consideration not only of Fishery, but also of Territorial, rights.

The facts set forth in this correspondence, and which, in their material points, are not the subject of dispute, warrant the Committee in expressing the opinion that, in this, as in other cases, there has been displayed, at times, on the part of Imperial authorities, a disposition to make undue concessions in fishery matters, to the aggressive claims of the subjects of France; and, to subordinate to politic or diplomatic exigencies, the undoubted rights of British subjects wherever such rights appeared to conflict with French assertions.

In the case of Messieurs Murphy and Andrews, it is apparent that the French have asserted a right to take and can lobsters, and to erect factories for the purpose of preserving lobsters upon British Territory.

The Committee cannot too strongly affirm the contention of this Colony, that the French have no right, under any existing Treaty, to take lobsters for commercial purposes in any British territorial waters; and therefore, a forliori, the Committee deny, with vehemence, the right asserted by the French of erecting factories for the purpose of canning lobsters taken in British waters for purposes of exportation and sale.

The Committee are constrained to regard with regretful resentment the fact that in the case under consideration, the removal of establishments erected by British subjects, for the purposes of taking and canning Lobsters, has been enforced by subjects of France at the instance of the French authorities, a French warship assisting, and a British warship interfering, to support the unwarranted contention of the French.

By reason of these unwarranted claims, and by this interference with the rights of British subjects, much damage and loss have accrued, and many of Her Majesty's subjects have been deprived of the means of subsistence for their families. The Committee regard, with reasonable apprehension and alarm, the probability of further encroachments upon British rights being made or attempted by the French, which must be disastrous to the interests of our people.

The Committee are of opinion that the claims of the French, in respect of the taking and preserving of Lobsters and Salmon on any portion of the coasts of this Island, are utterly without foundation, and cannot be maintained; and that the action of French subjects in this behalf, has been in violation of Treaty obligations, and of international law, a gross trespass upon the rights of British subjects, and one for which an exemplary compensation should be demanded from the Government of France.

The Committee, whilst not admitting that their conclusions in this behalf are open to discussion, would submit the following facts in support of their position, if these conclusions should be assumed to admit of argument:—

- 1.—Because it was declared by the Treaty of Utrecht that it should be unlawful for the French to erect buildings except those "necessary and usual for drying of fish."
- 2.—Because the Treaty of Paris (1763) restricted the liberty to "fishing and drying."
- 3.—Because the Treaty of Versailles (1783) speaks of "the fishery assigned to them by the Treaty of Utrecht."
- 4.—Because the declaration speaks of "the fishery" and "the method of carrying on the fishery, which has at all times been acknowledged shall be the plan upon which the fishery shall be carried on there."
- 5.—Because the French King's Counter Declaration speaks of "the fishery on the coast of Newfoundland, which has been the object of the new arrangements."
- 6.—Because the Treaty of Paris (1814) declares that the French right of fishery "shall be replaced upon the footing in which it stood in 1792."
- 7.—Because there was no such industry as a Lobster fishery in Newfoundland at any of these periods, and no such industry was heard of until within a few years past, and the language used to describe "the fishery" which the French were entitled to pursue is utterly inapplicable to Lobster catching or to the erection of factories for taking or canning Lobsters.

Having regard to all these facts, and the necessary deductions therefrom, the Committee are of opinion that in the assertion and

protection of British rights in Newfoundland, and for the avoidance of discord, tumult and disturbance between the subjects of the two great Powers, some firm and vigorous action should be taken—

- 1.—In the matter of the protection of British fishermen in the prosecution of their lawful avocations as regards the Lobster fishery;
- 2.—In the resistance to the claims of the French now first asserted in respect of this new industry;
- 3.—In the removal of all Lobster factories or buildings in connection with the Lobster fishery, erected by French subjects upon Newfoundland territory; and
- 4.—In the assertion and protection of the right of British subjects to the user of British territory in Newfoundland for agricultural, lumbering or mining purposes, without the interruption, molestation or interference of the French under any pretended treaty claims.

In order to carry into effect the views of the Committee, it is necessary to have the sympathy of the Imperial authorities, and the support of the Imperial power, and the Committee are therefore of opinion, and have—

Resolved,—That a humble Address to the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty should be forwarded by both branches of the Legislature of Newfoundland, setting forth the foregoing facts and conclusions.

Resolved,—That it should be the prayer of said Address, that the matters hereinbefore referred to, should be taken into the consideration of Her Majesty's advisers; that Her Majesty would graciously cause such action to be taken as would lead to the removal of all Lobster factories or buildings connected with the Lobster industry, erected by the French upon the territory of Newfoundland, and to the prevention of any such erections in future; and that Her Majesty would cause it to be an instruction to the Commanders and Officers of

Her ships engaged in the protection of the fisheries upon the coast of Newfoundland, that they should be aiding and assisting Her Majesty's subjects in this Island in the prevention of interference by the French with the prosecution of any lawful industries enterprised by British subjects.

Resolved,—That the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly be requested to confirm a joint Address of both Houses of the purport and with the prayers hereinbefore set forth.

> TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,-

We Your Majesty's humble and devoted subjects, the Legislative Council and the Commons House of Assembly of Newfoundland, beg to approach Your Majesty with an expression of our loyalty and devotion to Your Majesty's person and Throne.

Upon us, as branches of the Colonial Legislature, has devolved the duty of considering the subject of British rights and British claims on that portion of the Coast of Newfoundland on which the French have certain fishery privileges in special reference to certain claims asserted by subjects of France in the year 1888, in respect o the taking and preserving of Lobsters.

The claims of the French, in this behalf, have been now made for the first time.

The facts surrounding these new claims, are set forth in certain correspondence, which has been brought before us as a Legislature, which correspondence has already been a matter of consideration for Your Majesty's Ministers, and has formed a subject of diplomatic communication between Your Majesty's Ministers and the Government of France.

This correspondence has reference to the grievances complained of by two of Your Majesty's subjects, one Murphy, and one Andrews, who during the fishery season of 1888, were lawfully engaged in the prosecution of their business of taking and canning Lobsters at a place called Hauling Point, in White Bay, on the North East Coast of Newfoundland.

In connection with this correspondence and the grievances complained of, we have had occasion to regard and make reference to the action of our Colonial Legislature on former occasions, in respect of the large issues which are involved in the present subject of consideration; and we have had to revert to the assurances of Your Majesty, as, from time to time, given by Your Majesty's Ministers in confirmation of positions asserted and maintained by this Colony, as to the relative rights of British and French subjects on the Coast of Newfoundland under Treaties between the two great Powers.

In our present deliberations, we have been constrained to regard as a prominent cause of difficulty, these new claims, which in the case of Messieurs Murphy, and Andrews, seem to involve the consideration, not only of Fishery rights, but also of Territorial rights, which have hitherto been unquestioned.

The facts set forth before us, which, in their material points are not the subject of dispute, warrant us in the expression of the opinion that in this particular case, as in others, there has been displayed at times, on the part of Imperial authorities, a disposition to make undue concessions in Fishery matters to the aggressive claims of the subjects of France, and to subordinate to politic or diplomatic exigencies the undoubted rights of British Subjects.

In the case of Messieurs Murphy and Andrews, it is apparent that the French have asserted a right to take and can lobsters, and to erect upon British territory, Factories or Establishments for the purpose of preserving Lobsters.

With due devotion to Your Majesty, we cannot two strongly affirm the position taken by this Colony, that the French have no

right under any existing Treaty to take Lobsters for Commercial purposes in any territorial waters of this Island, and therefore a forliori, we humbly contend that the French are unwarranted in the erection of Factories or Establishments upon our Coasts, for the purpose of canning Lobsters taken in British waters for the purposes of exportation and sale. The claims asserted by the French in this behalf with all humility we vehemently deny.

We are constrained to regard with regretful resentment, the fact that in the case under consideration, the removal of Establishments erected by British subjects for the purpose of taking and canning Lobsters, has been enforced by subjects of France, at the instance of the French authorities, a French Warship assisting and a British Warship interfering to support the unwarranted contention of the French.

By reason of these unwarranted claims, and by this interference with the rights of Your Majesty's subjects, much damage and loss have accrued, and we have reason to believe that many of Your Majesty's subjects have been deprived of a means of subsistence for themselves and their families. We therefore regard with reasonable apprehension and alarm, the probability of further encroachments upon the rights of Your Majesty's subjects being made or attempted to be made by the subjects of France, the acquiescence in which encroachments must be disastrous to the interests of our people.

With all submissive we are constrained to state to Your Majesty our position that the claims of the subjects of France in respect of the taking and preserving of Lobsters upon our Coasts, and also their claims in respect of the taking of Salmon, which latter claims have also been a subject of our deliberations, are utterly without foundation and cannot be maintained, and that the action of French subjects in this behalf has been in violation of Treaty obligations and of International Law, and that there has resulted therefrom a gross trespass upon the rights of British subjects, for which an exemplary compensation should be demanded from the Government of France.

Whilst we humbly submit to Your Majesty, that our assertions of right, as Your Majesty's subjects in this behalf are unquestionable, we would further submit to Your Majesty, irrefragable character of our conclusions by reference to the following facts.

- (1.) Because it was declared by the Treaty of Utrecht that it should be unlawful for the French to erect buildings except those "necessary and usual for drying of fish."
- (2<sub>•</sub>) Because the Treaty of Paris, (1763) restricted the liberty to "fishing and drying."
- (3.) Because the Treaty of Versailles, (1783) speaks of "the fishery assigned to them by the Treaty of Utrecht."
- (4.) Because the declaration speaks of "the fishery" and "the method of carrying on the fishery, which has at all times been acknowledged, shall be the plan upon which the fishery shall be carried on there."
- (5.) Because the French King's Counter Declaration speaks of "the fishery on the Coast of Newfoundland, which has been the object of the new arrangements."
- (6.) Because the Treaty of Paris, (1814) declares that the French right of fishery "shall be replaced upon the footing in which it stood in 1792."
- (7.) Because there were no such industry as Lobster Fishery in Newfoundland at any of these periods, and no such industry was heard of until within a few years past, and the language used to describe "the fishery" which the French were entitled to pursue is utterly inapplicable to Lobster catching, or to the erection of Factories for taking or canning Lobsters.

Having regard to all the facts referred to and the necessary deductions relating therefrom, we are led to the expression of opinion,

that, in this matter, that is to say in the assertion and protection of the rights of Your Majesty's subjects in Newfoundland against the aggressive and unwarranted claims of French subjects, and for the avoidance of discord, tumult and disturbance between the subjects of the two great Powers, it is necessary that some firm and vigorous action should be taken by the Colony with the co-operation and active assistance of Your Majesty's Government.

We humbly submit that such action, should have special reference to the following points:

- (1.) To the protection of British Fishermen in the prosecution of their lawful avocations as regards the Lobster Fishery.
- (2.) To the resistance to the claims of the French now first asserted in respect of this new industry.
- (3.) To the removal of all Lobster Factories or Buildings in connection with the Lobster Fishery, erected by French subjects upon Newfoundland Territory.
- (4.) To the assertion and protection of the right of British subjects, to the use of British territory in Newfoundland for agricultural, lumbering or mining purposes, without the interruption, molestation or interference of the French under any pretended Treaty Claims.

For the causes herein set forth and with the grievances herein complained of, we, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, do therefore approach Your Majesty with the humble prayer, that Your Majesty will be pleased to take the same into gracious and favourable consideration, that Your Majesty will cause the same to be brought to the notice and consideration of Your Majesty's Ministers, that Your Majesty will graciously cause such action to be taken as shall lead to the removal of all Lobster Factories, or Establishments, or Buildings, connected with the Lobster industry, erected by the French upon the territory of Newfoundland, and to the prevention of

any such erections in future; and that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to cause it to be an instruction to the Commanders and Officers of Your Majesty's Ships, engaged in the protection of the Fisheries upon the Coast of Newfoundland, that they shall be aiding and assisting Your Majesty's subjects in this Island, in the prevention of interference by the French with the prosecution of any lawful industries enterprised by British subjects in Newfoundland.

Deign to accept Most Gracious Sovereign our profoundest expressions of loyalty and affection.

A MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

At four o'clock a Message from His Excellency the Governor was delivered by W. F. Rennie, Esq., the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, commanding the immediate attendance of Mr. Speaker and the House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House attended His Excellency the Governor in the Council Chamber.

And the Hon. the SPEAKER, at the Bar of the Council, addressed His Excellency, as follows:—

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :-

The House of Assembly of Newfoundland have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the Expenses of the Public Services.

In the name of the House of Assembly I present to Your Excellency the following Bills:

An Act to amend the Law relating to the taking of Seals and right of property therein.

An Act for Granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares and Merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies.

An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws relating to the Exportation and Sale of Bait Fishes.

An Act to make provision for the Construction of a Line of Railway to Hall's Bay, and for other purposes.

To which His Excellency was pleased to give His assent.

His Excellency was then pleased to make the following Speech to both branches of the Legislature:—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I am glad to be able to release you from your arduous labors at the close of an unusually protracted Session.

I notice, with pleasure, the care which you have bestowed upon the many important and usual measures that have engaged your attention. Foremost among these, is the Act making provision for the completion of the Line of Railway to Hall's Bay. The methods, which you have adopted for the immediate resumption of work, and for the ultimate execution of this great project, are such as will, I trust, provide for the protection of the public credit and financial interests of the Colony, and secure the accomplishment, upon a sound basis, of an undertaking which has been generally accepted as one of vital necessity to the future progress and prosperity of Newfoundland.

The formation of a Fisheries Commission is a measure which contains the promise of most beneficial results, in the acquisition and practical application of useful knowledge in relation to the preservation and improvement of our Fisheries.

The Consolidation of the Statute Law, and the application to the Colony of the practice and procedure of the Supreme Court in England, cannot fail to be of great value in connection with the administration of Justice.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I have to thank you for the supplies granted by you for the public service of the Colony, which shall be applied with due regard both to economy and efficiency.

I am also pleased to observe the provision that you have made for various useful public works and improvements.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

I shall forward without delay your addresses to Her Majesty, on the subject of recent trouble between our fishermen and those of France, in connection with questions of Fishery and Territorial Rights, especially in relation to Lobster Factories, and, I am certain that Her Majesty's Government will not fail to accord the fullest possible attention to your representation, and that you may rely upon their earnest sympathy, and, I can assure you that I will use my best efforts towards the full assertion and maintenance of the just claims of our people, consistent with existing Treaty obligations.

I am pleased to be able to congratulate you upon the generally successful issue of the Seal-fishery, and I trust that the ensuing season may be attended with no less fortunate results from the other occupations of our people.

In bidding you farewell, I earnestly trust that under the blessing of Providence, your efforts as Legislators may tend towards the promotion of the general prosperity and contentment of the people of this Colony; and, I beg to assure you of my cordial wishes for your welfare in your private avocations.
