Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

Governor's Speech.

You will, I feel sure, with all Her Majesty's loyal subjects throughout her vast Empire, warmly sympathize with our Gracious Queen and the members of the Royal Family in their sad bereavement, through the untimely death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, taken from their midst at a moment when they and the whole nation had united in the hope that a long life of happiness and utility awaited him.

At the commencement of your legislative duties, I congratulate you upon the favorable aspect of the Colony's position.

The year that has passed since I last convened the Legislature for the despatch of business has been replete with blessings, for which we owe to the Giver of all Good our reverent acknowledgment.

We have every reason to be thankful for the success which attended our fisheries, for the result of our harvest and the decrease of poverty, as well as for the improved condition of the public health, and the absence of commercial disaster.

(Continued.)

In reviewing the events of the past twelve speech—months, we have first to take cognizance of the exceptionally good Seal-fishery. That of the previous season was considered to be above the average, but it will be seen that the export of the products of this fishery during 1891 exceeded that of the former year by more than one-half.

This was followed by a Shore Cod-fishery above the average, and the most abundant catch of cod on the Labrador that has been realized for very many years. Ready markets and good prices contributed largely to enhance the value of the returns.

There is also a marked improvement to be noticed in connection with our mining industry. The export of copper ores and iron pyrites was largely in excess of that of the previous year, and valuable deposits of asbestos and gypsum have been worked with energy and success.

In connection with this, I may observe that the Geological Survey, during the past year, has established beyond question what has hitherto been a matter of conjecture, namely, the existence of considerable deposits of coal and iron ores in the vicinity of Grand Lake. I cannot, therefore, too strongly emphasize the importance of this discovery, and the desirability of your taking such action as may be considered necessary to turn the same to the advantage of the Colony. It is gratifying to find that the amendment in the Crown Lands' Act, regarding the granting of mineral lands, which was passed last Session, has led to an increased demand for mining locations.

Although last winter was not a favorable one for lumbering operations, the business done in the

export of timber was in excess of the previous year. This industry has become an important auxiliary to our commerce, and I am pleased to be able to state that there is evidence of its still greater development.

The amount of deposits in our Savings' Bank shows a large increase over 1890, and it is a matter for congratulation that since the passing of the Act to provide for the appropriation of the profits of that institution, it has been found possible to apply the sum of three hundred thousand dollars towards the liquidation of the public debt of the Colony.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

The Customs Revenue for the year 1891 was in excess of the Estimate. The Estimates for the coming year, and the Public Accounts, will be laid before you at an early date, and I feel assured that you will make due provision for the requirements of the Public Service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honorable House of Assembly:

The difference existing between Her Majesty's Government and that of France, respecting the Treaty Shore of this Island, has not yet been adjusted, but it is hoped that the negotiations still in progress, as well as whatever legislation you may deem necessary, after receiving the report of the Delegates sent by you to England in reference to this matter, may result in the establishment of the

position which seems to my Government so just Speech—(Continued.) and reasonable.

The negotiations opened with the Administration at Washington for a Treaty of reciprocal trade between this Colony and the United States, to which I adverted in my speech on the opening of the Legislature last year, are still in abeyance, awaiting ratification by Her Majesty's Government.

As a necessary sequence to the conduct of the Government of the Dominion of Canada, in imposing duty upon the fishery products of this Colony entering Canadian ports, that clause in the Revenue Act, introduced in the year 1885, which provides for the imposition of an additional duty on goods, wares and merchandize imported into this Colony and its Dependencies, has, by virtue of the said action of our neighbors, come into operation.

It is to be hoped that a more favorable disposition on the part of the Canadian Government may remove the occasion for a continuance of those additional duties.

I am glad to be able to announce that the work on the Railway towards Hall's Bay is progressing satisfactorily. About sixty-five miles have been completed, and it is expected that by the end of the present year the important settlement of Gambo, in Bonavista Bay, will be brought into railway communication with the Capital.

My Government have invited tenders for three steamers to ply upon the great Northern Bays, so as to bring all the important settlements in these bays into close connection with the railway.

Speech-

It is considered advisable that a survey for a (Continued.) line of Railway to the West Coast, via Grand Lake, should be undertaken next summer, so that tenders may be invited for the construction of the line at an early day, and you will be invited to make an appropriation for that purpose.

> A Census of the population of the Colony, for which you made provision last Session, has been completed, and an abstract of the returns will be laid before you immediately.

> The sum of twenty thousand dollars voted by the Legislature last Session for the improvement of Education has been distributed as a bonus to Teachers. This recognition of the valuable services of a most deserving class of public officials it is hoped will stimulate them to greater effort in their important calling.

> The Colony has been invited to take part in the World's Columbian Exposition, to be held in the city of Chicago in 1893. If Newfoundland is to be represented, it is imperative that a suitable appropriation for that purpose should be made, which subject may be advantageously considered in connection with the provisions to be made for the Local Exhibition to be held here next autumn.

> In conclusion, I would express the hope that under the inspiration of the increased prosperity to which I have briefly referred, your deliberations may be harmonious, and that the dictates of prudence and patriotism may lead to the adoption of measures calculated to promote the still greater advancement of the Colony.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY;—

Address in reply to Speech of Governor. We, the Legislative Council in Session convened, beg to thank Your Excellency for the gracious Speech with which you have been pleased to open the present Session of the Legislature.

We join Your Excellency in the expression of sympathy with our gracious Queen and the members of the Royal Family in their sad bereavement through the untimely death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale. We availed of the earliest opportunity of uniting with the Honorable the House of Assembly in passing an Address of Condolence to Her Majesty, in reference to the lamentable event.

We concur with Your Excellency that we have reason to be thankful for the success which has for the past year attended our several industries, and for the improved condition of the public health.

The marked improvement referred to by Your Excellency, in connection with our mining operations, is a subject of congratulation.

Adjustrally.

We are pleased to find that the Geological Sur-Address—vey during the past year, tends to confirm the report of the existence of coal and iron ores near the Grand Lake. Any measure that may be introduced, having for its object their further development, shall engage our best attention.

It is satisfactory to learn that there has been an improvement in the lumbering operations of the country, and that there is a reasonable hope of greater advancement in that direction.

We are glad to find that there has been an increased amount of deposits in our Savings' Bank over that of the year 1890.

We regret to learn that the questions long pending between Her Majesty's Government and that of France, respecting the Treaty shore of this Island, are yet unsettled. We trust that the negotiations now proceeding may result in such a settlement as will meet the just and reasonable expectations of our people.

We trust that the negotiations respecting a Treaty of Reciprocal Trade between this Colony and the United States may soon be satisfactorily concluded.

We notice that in consequence of the imposition of duties by the Canadian Government upon our fisherry products in Canadian ports, the clause in the Revenue Act of 1885, providing for additional duties on imports into this Colony and its Dependencies, has come into operation. We trust that some arrangement may be speedily effected which will lead to the discontinuance of these additional burthens on trade.

Address— (Continued.)

We are pleased with the information that satisfactory progress has been made with the Hall's Bay Railroad.

The advantages which would be afforded by steamers upon our Northern Bays, bringing important settlements into connection with the railway, cannot fail to be highly appreciated.

We thank your Excellency for the promise to lay before us an abstract of the Census taken last season.

The distribution, as a bonus to Teachers, of the amount voted last year towards the improvement of Education will doubtless have the desired effect of stimulating them to greater effort in the discharge of their duties.

We are pleased with the information that Newfoundland has been invited to take part in the World's Columbian Exhibition, to be held in the city of Chicago in 1893.

We unite with your Excellency in the hope that our deliberations may tend to the adoption of measures calculated to promote the advancement of the Colony.

\*\*REPORT OF DELEGATES.\*\*

To the Honorable the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened:

Report.

- 1. The Delegates upon the French Treaties Question, appointed by the Legislature last Session, had the honor to make an interim report, dated May 11th, 1891, accompanied by copies of correspondence and other documents, and one of their number, Mr. A. B. Morine, was permitted, at their request, to make verbal explanations to your Honorable Houses in joint Session convened, concerning the subject of their mission.
- 2. The Delegates now have the honor to submit the following supplementary Report, with copies of correspondence conducted after that date, and of other documents in connection with their labors.
- 3. At the date of Mr. Morine's departure from London, the Bill introduced in the House of Lords, for the purpose of enforcing the French Treaties, had passed through all its stages in that House, and it was introduced into the House of Commons on the 13th of the same month, the second reading being set down for the 28th May, after the Whitsuntide holidays elapsed. Between the 21st and 28th May, your Delegates conferred on various occasions, by correspondence and otherwise, with

the British Government, in reference to the terms Report,—
of the temporary Act, eventually passed by the
Legislature, and as to the principle of a proposed
permanent Act to supersede the temporary one.

- 4. Pending an agreement, the Delegates made preparation for the presentation of the case of the Colony at the Bar of the House of Commons, and were granted permission to address that House on the day set down for the second reading of the Bill, against the passage of which they were instructed to protest. In the meantime the Legislature had been put in possession of the information conveyed by Mr. Morine, and had received recommendations by the remaining Delegates as to the necessity of enacting, with certain amendments, the proposed temporary Act forwarded by the Delegates.
- 5. On the 27th, that Act was read a third time in the Legislative Council, having been passed by the House of Assembly on the 26th, and on the morning of the 28th the Delegates conveyed the information, that it had passed, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, who, whilst the Delegates were waiting to be called to the Bar of the House of Commons for the purpose of being heard, caused them to be informed that Her Majesty's Government would withdraw the Bill from before the Commons, after it had passed its second reading. Upon the motion for the second reading of the Bill, a debate arose in the Commons, as the result of which the second reading was not proceeded with.
- 6. The Delegates lost no time in making arrangements for the further progress of their work; and, on Saturday the 30th May, they made an ar-

rangement for a conference with Mr. Bramston on the following Monday upon the terms of the proposed permanent Act. On the day appointed, the conference took place. Your Delegates then submitted the draft Bill hereto annexed, marked "A." Discussion in reference to that draft took place at conferences held during the week.

- 7. On the 6th June the Hon. M. Monroe left for home, taking with him a letter from the Delegates, and on the 22nd of June Mr. Emerson also left for home, taking with him a copy of a draft Bill that day submitted on behalf of the British Government, and hereto annexed, marked "B." Between the 22nd June and the departure of the Hon. A. W. Harvey, on the 6th July, several conferences were held concerning that Bill, and many alterations made, involving great care and considerable labor. Further conferences occurred and other alterations were made between the 6th of July and the departure of Sir W. Whiteway, on the 4th day of August, the result of which is embodied in the Bill hereto annexed, marked "C."
- 8. The terms of that Bill are not in accordance with the basis submitted by your Delegates to the British Government on 1st of June, hereto annexed, marked "A," and are not satisfactory to your Delegates. They therefore recommend that an attempt be made, by correspondence, to procure amendments, and that pending the result of that correspondence, no further progress be made with the Bill. As the temporary Act passed last Session does not expire until the end of 1893, there will be ample time to negotiate further, and, if deemed advisable, to enact a permanent Act next Session.

- 9. Recognizing the fact that the conduct of Report your Delegates in recommending to the Legislature the adoption of the temporary Act, enacted last Session, has been the subject of severe criticism, we feel justified in reminding the Legislature, that, when we received our commission to proceed to England, there was pending before Parliament a Bill which had been framed upon the lines of an Act more than a century old, which placed in the hands of Her Majesty's naval officers the exercise of powers which may be justly termed harsh.
- 10. Public sentiment in Great Britain demanded the enforcement of the French Treaties, Parliament was unanimous in supporting that demand, and it was therefore apparent that if the Legislature would do nothing the Bill before Parliament would become law. Fortunately the Legislature adopted our unanimous recommendations, the temporary Bill proposed by us became law, and was accepted by the Parliament, the Government and the people of the mother country, as an evidence of good faith on the part of the Colony, and of an earnest desire to bring about a permanent settlement of a dangerous and unfortunate condition of affairs. The proposed Imperial Act was abandoned, and time in which to secure a more careful consideration of a permanent Act was assured.
- 11. Your Delegates were able also by their efforts to bring prominently before the British public the hardships under which the Colony suffers in consequence of the French Treaties, and to make it certain that whenever an opportunity occurs for a satisfactory settlement it will not be lost.

Legislation having become imperative through action emanating from here, England, last year, solely on the earnest representations of delegates from this Legislature, stayed the passing of the bill required to carry out her treaty obligations with France, and to protect her officers when employed on fishery duty; confiding to you the enactment of this necessary measure, it is therefore with extreme regret that I find the House of Assembly has thrown out the bill, presented to it for this purpose, and I can only now trust that this action may not be prejudicial to the interests of the colony, interests which, I can assure you, I have deeply at heart.

It is exceedingly gratifying to observe that the Seal-fishery which so largely affects our general interests has been most successful, and I trust that our other fisheries, our agricultural and our general industries may in the ensuing year equally show such happy results.

I thank you for the liberality with which you have provided for the public service. Your grants shall be applied with careful regard to the intentions which directed the appropriations.


