


Curriculum, Programs, and International Education:

Responsibilities include providing for the full range of curriculum implementation; student assessment and evaluation; student placement, distance learning; supporting the core program with programs designed to improve the teaching and learning process; and teacher professional development. The Board also develops and provides support for school development. The Board actively supports and promotes initiatives to attract international students and develops international partnerships through the Newfoundland International Student Education Program (NISEP).




Public Exam Results:

The 2007-08 public exam results show that Eastern School District generally meets or exceeds the Provincial average. It also should be noted that while the District was below the Provincial average in some courses, Eastern School District had a higher percentage of enrollment. For example, as a percentage of Level III enrolment, Francais 3202 was 10.5% for Eastern School District, and only 2.5% for the Province. Encouraging participation in academic programs was part of the District's mandate for the past strategic planning cycle.



Student Support Services:

Responsibilities include the implementation, administration, and monitoring of programs and services to students with special needs. This includes implementation of provincial policy on Individual Student Support Services Plans (ISSP) as well as the Pathways to Graduation Program.



Corporate Services and Financial Administration:

The Board has responsibility for compliance with provincial financial legislation and regulations; acquisition of materials, equipment, and services; school construction in conjunction with the Department of Education; properties and facilities management; transportation management; support staff payroll; collaborating with the Department of Education on teacher payroll; information technology; protection of privacy and access to information requests; and school finance.



Fixed versus Non-Fixed Operating Costs (including salaries)


Figure 1 shows how the Board's operating budget is apportioned between those costs that are fixed and those that allow the District to have a limited level of



The "fixed" costs flexibility. include such items as salaries and benefits. pupil electricity, transportation, telecommunications. fuel. telephone, snow clearing, and municipal taxes, and totalled District's 96% of the total expenditures for the year. The remaining 4% is spent on such professional things as development, instructional materials, and equipment and building repairs.

Expenditure by Major Category (excluding salaries)

Figure 2 shows how the expenditures of the Board for the year, excluding salaries and benefits, are distributed among the major categories with equivalent percentage cost comparisons. The fixed cost of pupil transportation accounts for 41% of this total; operations and maintenance costs took an additional 38



per cent; instructional costs received 12%; District administration three percent; and other costs, including capital expenditures, six percent.

Shared Commitments:

Eastern School Board relies on the commitment and cooperation of a number of partners in the delivery of high-quality education to our students.

Department of Education:

Eastern School Board operates within the context of the *Schools Act, 1997*. The act provides school boards with the direct responsibility for the administration and operation of schools including staffing, distribution of resources, technology, repair and maintenance of school buildings, student transportation, and the development of instructional policies and practices. The Eastern School District receives its teacher allocation, operational and capital funding from the Department of Education.

School Councils:

"The purpose of a school council is to develop, encourage and promote policies, practices and activities to enhance the quality of school programs and the levels of student achievement in the school" (Schools Act, 1997). School councils are relied upon by the Board to provide meaningful input into the operation of each school by monitoring teaching and learning in schools, providing input to the annual school report, and advising their schools and the Board on matters important to the learning community. The Eastern School Board is committed to working with all school councils to improve the delivery of education to each student.

Outcomes of Objectives and Goals: Strategic Plan 2006-08

Mission- 2006-08

This Mission Statement was originally developed for 2006 to 2011. However, in the time period between its development and the development of the 2008-11 Strategic Plan, extensive consultation took place. As such, the board felt it appropriate to develop a new mission in light of the significant stakeholder input received for the 2008-11 period.

The following details the board's successful achievement of the 2006-08 Mission.

Mission: By June 30, 2011, the Eastern School Board will have improved

programming and supported safe and caring learning environments

for students.

Measure 1: Improved programming to support an enhanced learning environment.

Indicators:

Maximized teacher resources

The District worked with numerous partners since 2006 to create and/or make available new resources for teachers to utilize in their classroom instruction. For example Eastern School District, in conjunction with Eastern Health, produced the first edition of Living Healthy News which is a regional newsletter to provide school staff and Eastern Health staff with information regarding health promotion in schools. Similarly, related to the ISSP review, the Department of Education developed an online resource site of alternate courses and curriculum which is being used by District teachers. These examples, along with a multitude of other resources that have been generated internally, externally, or through partnerships, have given teachers a larger toolkit from which to better educate our students.

Improved test results

The District has placed considerable emphasis on mathematics in the 2006-08 time frames. For example, common intermediate mathematics assessments

were created by District-wide committees of teachers for Grades 7 and 8. Sample assessments were sent to schools, and the final June, 2008 assessments were written by approximately 83% of our schools. Also common assessment question banks were provided for all Grade 9 Mathematics units. Results are evident in the District's three year trend on primary mathematics CRT's is positive, in elementary the District improved in eight of nine areas, and in intermediate the District scored above the Province in five of eight areas.

Increased teacher professional development

The District has increased the effectiveness of professional development by allowing teachers to annually submit professional growth plans, thus focusing the District's professional development opportunities on identified needs. For the 2006-08 period, this culminated in the Programs Division providing for the very first time professional development for all teachers during the four regional closeouts held in the fall of 2007. The theme of the closeouts was Professional Learning Communities – Caring, Connecting and Collaborating which focused on Assessment for Learning. The District also implemented District-wide professional development sessions for the first time, increasing opportunities for collaboration among teachers in different regions of the District.

Increased number of students in academic programming

Throughout the District's 2006-08 strategic plan, renewed emphasis was placed on measuring success in high school by academic course participation. Senior Education Officers, in consultation with school administrators, are ensuring a District culture is created whereby students are streamed into academic programs whenever possible. This is a long term process, as high school course and stream selection typically occurs in junior high. During the period of this plan, there was no observed increase in academic graduation rates. Consequently firm percentage increases in academic graduation rates will continue to be a challenge during the next planning cycle. However it is noteworthy that during the two year period of the plan, the high school honours graduation rate rose by approximately four percent.

Increased use of technology

During the 2006-08 period, the board increased the use of technology throughout the District. This was achieved by the Programs Division with 27 Information, Communication and Learning Technologies projects which were undertaken in various schools. Furthermore, several software licenses and numerous pieces of hardware were purchased and are now in use by students. For example, the District purchased a license for FxDraw 3 which ensures teachers and students have access to technology in the mathematics curriculum. The introduction of SMARTboards in the District has also been a resounding success. This interactive and dynamic technology has great potential.

<u>Improved instruction</u>

The addition of six new Senior Education Officers for Instruction and School Leadership permits the District to provide more direct support to schools, to work

within the School Development model to impact student achievement, and improve instruction. This, combined with improvements in professional development, has led to tangible benefits in instructional practices.

Increased K-6 math achievement and supports

The announcement of the new mathematics curriculum included a three year implementation plan which includes new texts and resources. Teachers as Researchers into Mathematics - The Eastern School District, in partnership with the Department of Education, and The Primary/Elementary Special Interest Council of the Newfoundland and Labrador Teachers' Association, co-sponsored a professional development teacher research program that involved teachers inquiring into teacher learning, and the learning and teaching of mathematics. The three year trend in Primary Mathematics is positive with the exception of number operations (multiple choice), addition and subtraction. However, in all three of these areas the District still scored at or above the Provincial level in 2008. In CRT's for grades three and six, from 2006 to 2008 there was an observed increase in the percentage of students performing at level three and above.

Measure 2: Supported a safe and caring learning environment

Indicators:

<u>Improved infrastructure</u>

The Board was able to improve infrastructure in conjunction with the Department of Education which provided significant funding for both large and small capital projects. \$80,600,000 was spent in 2007-08 alone. Many extension projects have been approved by government, as well as new school construction projects for Paradise and Torbay.

Increased safe schools policies

Safe schools policies were increased throughout the District. A Safe and Caring Schools Policy was approved by the School Board in June, 2008. In addition, the "safe and caring schools" philosophy has been adopted throughout the District and is present in most school development plans. These actions complement government's Violence Prevention Initiative which is intended to ensure all people's safety, dignity and freedom from the threat of violence.

Increased school development plans

In September 2006 there were still some schools in the District which had not finalized their school development plans. All schools in Eastern School District now have three year school development plans, which are reviewed annually. These plans form the framework of operations for duly elected school councils at each school.

Increased number of schools in compliance with provincial policy

During the 2006-08 period, the Board ensured an increased number of schools were in compliance with Board policies which are now more reflective of government policies. A review of the Eastern School District's policies, constitution, and by-laws was conducted, determining where modifications were required to be in full compliance with the *Schools Act*, 1997. The District is committed to be in compliance with all relevant legislation and policies of government.

Increased maintenance of schools

In the term of the strategic plan, government increased the funding allocation for repairs and maintenance, which permitted the Board to complete an increased number of maintenance requests, which had previously been deferred, during the 2006-08 period.

Issue One: Education System that Supports Student Learning

As referenced in the 2006-08 Strategic Plan, the urban areas of the District, such as St. John's, Mount Pearl, Paradise, and Conception Bay South, remained a challenge with issues related to location and capacity. These are further complemented by population growth in Paradise and Conception Bay South.

The following details the Board's effort to address these issues during the past two years in accordance with the Minister's strategic directions with respect to the quality and accessibility of educational programs.

Objective Two: By June 30, 2008 the Eastern School Board will have completed the greater St. John's component of Phase II Planning and will have completed an organizational review to better support teaching and learning in the District.

Measure Two: Completed St. John's area Planning Document.

Indicators/Actions:

Completed and implemented an organizational review.

The Board completed and implemented an organizational review.
 As a result of review the family of schools model was developed, implemented and is now fully functioning. In addition, the hiring of six new Senior Education Officers enhanced the Board's ability to better serve teachers, thus supporting student learning.

Presented proposals and rationales to government for required supportive facilities.

 The Board presented proposals and rationales to government for required supportive facilities. As part of the Phase II planning cycle, the Board successfully worked with Government to have architectural/engineering assessments done of Holy Heart and Bishops College. Based on these assessments, budgetary projections, population trend analyses, and community consultation, the Board recommended the replacement of both facilities. It should also be noted that Booth Memorial, which was previously slated for closure, is tied to Bishops and Holy Heart in terms of population. Consequently, the recommendation is that the three 50-year-old facilities (Holy Heart, Bishops and Booth) be replaced by two new ones. Several other facilities are also slated for renovation and/or replacement, as detailed in Appendix Two.

Completed assessments on all remaining schools.

The Board has completed assessments on all remaining schools.
 Outside of the facility changes specifically noted in the Phase II motions, the remaining facilities are all considered suitable for continued use for the duration of the planning cycle. As warranted by ongoing population shifts, and associated area-specific growth/decline, the Board will continuously monitor schools and proactively suggest/implement changes.

Completed Phase II Restructuring Plan.

 The Phase II planning cycle was completed resulting in draft motions being released, consultations with stakeholders held, final motions being released, and a second set of consultations held. Finally, the Board adopted the motions at the May 6th, 2008 meeting (included in Appendix Two).

Goal One: By June 30, 2008, the Eastern School Board will have reconfigured, where necessary, the learning environments throughout the District to support student learning.

Measure 1: Reconfigured learning environments.

Indicators:

Completed and implemented organizational review.

• In 2007-08, this was accomplished. As detailed above, this has improved service to district schools in support of student learning.

Presented proposals and rationales to government for required supportive facilities.

 Research and analysis over the past two fiscal years led to the successful preparation of these proposals in 2007-08 as detailed above.

Completed assessments of all district schools.

• During the two-year period, all district schools were assessed to ensure suitability of learning environments. Board motions were passed and recommendations made to government as appropriate. These included the restructuring of select feeder systems.

Completed Phase II Restructuring Plan.

 Phase II planning involved CBS, Paradise, Mount Pearl and the greater St. John's area. This was an enormous undertaking given the number of school facilities and students, and age of existing infrastructure. As detailed above, final board motions have now been passed.

The successful achievement of the 2007-08 objective, along with work completed in the 2006-07 year, has enabled the ESD to achieve this goal.

Issue Two: Leadership Development

As referenced in the 2006-08 Strategic Plan, analysis had indicated a decline in the quantity of applicants interested in assuming formal leadership roles as well as a decline in the quality of skills and abilities that applicants bring to these positions. In light of pending retirements, the Board recognized the need for leadership and succession planning.

The following details the Board's effort to address these issues during the past two years in accordance with the Minister's strategic directions with respect to innovative and high performing educational delivery systems.

Objective Two: By June 30, 2008 the Eastern School Board will have increased interest in leadership positions in the District.

Measure Two: Interest in administrative competitions.

Indicators/Actions:

Increased participation in administrative competitions.

 The District has seen a growth of 12% in applications for administrative positions. It is anticipated that this trend will continue into the future, as a result of work being done with those expressing an interest in administration (see next items).

Increased skill set of candidates.

• For the first time, teachers hired directly into administrative positions for the 2007-08 school year (16 of 28) completed a succession program to increase their knowledge and skill set in leadership and administration. This program continued during the 2007-08 year with 112 participants and 27 of the 36 new administrators hired for 2008-09 school year having completed the program. Once hired all the new administrators complete Leadership Development sessions to further enhance their leadership skills and administrative knowledge.

Established a succession plan.

• 112 teachers throughout the District took part in our Succession program. Special effort was made to recruit participants from all regions of the District. While this program continues to be enhanced, it increases awareness of the positive role that administrators play in our system. Participants are provided professional development in all areas of leadership and administration. This provided them a foundation of knowledge to facilitate movement to leadership positions within the District. Forty-four of the participants went on to apply for administrative positions.

Goal Two: By June 30, 2008 the Eastern School Board will have enhanced leadership development within the Eastern School District to support student achievement.

Measure 1: Enhanced leadership development.

Indicators:

Established and implemented a formal leadership development program.

 A three-component leadership development program was developed and implemented over the past two years. Interest in the program was high with 95 applicants. Of the 40 candidates selected, 38 have successfully completed the program. The Board continues to encourage females to participate in leadership development activities.

Increased participation in administrative competitions.

 As noted above, interest in administrative positions has significantly increased. It is anticipated that further increases will result from ongoing efforts.

Increased interest in leadership positions.

• The District's succession plan has led to an increased interest in leadership positions throughout the District. Thirty-nine per cent of the participants have since applied for positions.

Established a succession plan.

• A succession plan was finalized in 2007-08 with 112 persons participating in sessions.

The successful achievement of the 2007-08 objective, along with work completed in the 2006-07 year, has enabled the ESD to achieve this goal.

Issue Three: Enhanced Learning Environments

As referenced in the 2006-08 Strategic Plan, the Board believes that all students, employees, and volunteers within the District have a right to a safe, secure and caring environment. To facilitate this, the Board recognized that the policies/guidelines of the four former boards had to be reviewed and new ones developed. The new policies and guidelines will need to be reflective of the larger District, both in terms of geography and student population.

The following details the Board's efforts to address these issues during the past two years.

Objective Two: By June 30, 2008 the Eastern School Board will have a full complement of approved governance policies that will allow the District to be fully compliant with statutory, legislative and organizational requirements, and collective agreements.

Measure Two: Governance policies.

Indicators/Actions:

Implemented a District co-curricular and athletics policy.

- The Board's Co-curricular Policy was fully implemented this year.
 This policy recognizes that co-curricular activities are an integral
 and valuable part of a student's experience at school. Schools can
 most effectively support student learning by enhancing the regular
 school program with opportunities for student participation in a
 variety of age appropriate co-curricular activities.
- The Board's Athletic Policy was fully implemented in 2007/08, balancing the provision of opportunities for athletically-oriented students with participation opportunities for all. The policy provides direction and support for schools wishing to provide an athletics program to students and in doing so, sets appropriate regulations to ensure the safety of all participants.
- The Nutrition Policy complements both the co-curricular and athletics policies and will be fully implemented by schools in September 2008. To help schools move to full implementation of the Nutrition Policy, an in-service was held in April 2008 to bring together catering companies, suppliers and individuals who are directly involved with menu development and ordering food for school canteens and cafeterias.

Implemented approved governance policies.

- The Board conducted a review of the Board's constitution, by-laws, policies and protocols within the context of the School's Act 1997.
- The District has implemented a full complement of approved polices, and continues to build policy and modify regulations to ensure compliance with emergent needs and new legislation.

- An Access to Information and Protection of Privacy (ATIPP)
 Handbook of Frequently Asked Questions was developed and
 distributed to all schools.
- The Newfoundland International Student Education Program established higher standards of accountability and transparency of protocols and practices relative to international student education.

Goal Three: By June 30, 2008, the Eastern School Board will have enhanced learning environments.

Measure 1: Enhanced learning environments.

Indicators:

Continued implementation of Safe and Caring Schools Policy.

 Throughout the two year period, the District established both District and school Safe and Caring Schools teams and working groups to ensure implementation of the policy. Components of the implementation included professional development and character education.

Implemented the District's nutrition policy.

 The nutrition policy was implemented and guidelines were developed for use in all schools. These guidelines are consistent with the Provincial School Food Guidelines and enhance the learning environment by ensuring healthy food choices are prevalent in schools.

Implemented a District co-curricular and athletics policy.

- As referenced above, both policies were fully implemented in 2007/08. Implemented the District's smoke-free environment policy.
- The smoke-free environment policy was implemented in District schools and included signage outside every school, poster contests, smoke-free wall murals, and smoke-free messages in the high school chemistry curriculum.

Implemented approved governance policies.

 As referenced above, the District now has a full complement of approved polices.

The successful achievement of the 2007-08 objective, along with work completed in the 2006-07 year, has enabled the ESD to achieve this goal.

Issue Four: Communications

As referenced in the 2006-08 Strategic Plan, the Board committed to developing and implementing a comprehensive communications plan. This was especially important in light of the geographic size of the District and the fact that it encompasses large urban schools, small rural schools, and some isolated schools.

The following details the Board's efforts to address these issues.

Objective Two: By June 30, 2008, the Eastern School Board will have developed and implemented a plan that recognizes and promotes the accomplishments of students and employees.

Measure Two: Improved communication.

In 2007-08 the Eastern School Board developed and implemented a communications plan. This plan recognizes and promotes the accomplishments of students and employees, and incorporates the following indicators / actions.

Indicators/Actions:

Base line established for complaints.

 The 2007-08 school year would be used as a base line year in which a summary of complaints (63) would be compiled as a comparison for subsequent years.

Increased promotion of good news stories.

 The Good News section of the District website continues to grow in popularity and monthly submissions from schools have increased from 106 in 2006-07 to 197 in 2007-08. This success is partly attributed to the new on-line submission form which makes it easier to submit good news stories and pictures.

Increased employee recognition.

 A recognition policy was drafted / and implemented allowing for the identification and celebration of exceptional deeds of students and/or staff, as well as acknowledgement for long service employees.

Increased student recognition

• The District website continues to promote good news and accomplishments of both individuals and school communities.

Goal Four: By June 30, 2008, the Eastern School Board will have developed and implemented a comprehensive communications plan.

Measure 1: Developed Communications Plan.

Indicators:

Increased organizational self-awareness.

 Organizational self-awareness has been increased through the development of a monthly report from the Director of Education which is now prepared, distributed to all schools and posted to the District website. It keeps the entire district school community informed of current issues and progress achieved. Other key elements include the increased recognition of both students and employees.

Increased visibility of Eastern School Board.

 This was achieved through a re-designed website with more online information for stakeholders. The site is now easier to use and content is contained in a new and clearer format.

Increased promotion of good news stories.

 The re-designed website now includes a Good News section with an online form to which schools can submit stories for posting.

The successful achievement of the 2007-08 objective, along with work completed in the 2006-07 year, has enabled the ESD to achieve this goal.



Highlights & Accomplishments

Human Resources:

- The Board successfully negotiated, with assistance from Treasury Board, a new collective agreement with CUPE local 1560 (Avalon East Region) and local 2033 (Burin Region).
- The Board recruited a Professional Engineer as its new Manager of Operations for the District. This position reports to the Director of Facilities and Maintenance and is the team lead for the Regional Operations Managers and Maintenance Supervisors who are, in turn, responsible for the daily operation and maintenance of facilities.
- As a consequence of the new teacher allocation model, the Board hired six additional Senior Education Officers. These positions will be instrumental in enhancing support to schools.
- In accordance with the Minister's strategic direction with respect to innovative and high-performing educational delivery systems the Board hired 11 numeracy support teachers for the K-6 level. Their primary role was to work collaboratively with classroom teachers to support instructional/assessment strategies to engage children in learning mathematics. They also provided supports to schools in implementing their mathematics action plan, in the promoting of mathematics, and assisting schools in providing support for parents with respect to the mathematics curriculum, instruction, and assessment.
- A full complement of human resource professionals has been hired, providing support in the areas of recruitment and benefits, occupational health and safety, support staff, student assistants, and teacher personnel.
- The Board, in partnership with the Newfoundland and Labrador School Boards Association, established an internal Hay Plan rating committee, which will improve the accuracy and timeliness of management-level classifications.
- A claims disability management database was developed to track injured employees and their status in our system.

Administration and Planning:

- Strategic Plan 2008-2011 was prepared and approved by the Board of Trustees in June 2008 for submission to the Minister.
- The second annual District and Regional Office Support Staff Team-Building Day was held in April. Staff received professional development in occupational health and safety, ergonomics, and healthy living.
- A global positioning system (GPS) was purchased to capture new street information as subdivisions are being built. This allows for more timely updating of the District website as well as the internal geographic information system. A mapping application was also placed online, enabling the public to get maps of school catchments and other pertinent information.
- A comprehensive review of information technology security measures was completed to enhance the protection and safe-guarding of personal and confidential information stored on Eastern School District computer systems.

Technology:

- The Board purchased a District license for mathematical software, which ensures teachers and students have access to up-to-date technology in the mathematics curriculum.
- The Board purchased specialized tools to measure moisture levels in schools. In conjunction with related professional development of support staff, the Board's aim is to detect moisture prior to mould growth or other damage occurring.
- An on-line call in system for substitute student assistants has proven to be
 a time-saver for administrators, a convenience for employees, and
 ensures compliance with the collective agreement.
- Enhancements were made to the Board's personnel package to include an online reference and nomination form. This increases efficiency and reflects privacy awareness.
- A new finance system for school-raised monies (e-Funds) was piloted in several schools. This software integrates with the District's accounting system. Larger scale implementation has been slowed by the need for manual conversion work from present accounting systems, and the need for training. However, ultimately this will simplify accounting for schools and improve District accountability.

Active & Healthy Living:

In accordance with the Minister's strategic direction with respect to the quality and accessibility of educational programs, the Board promoted programs and strategies which addressed healthy living and physical education.

- "Eastern Active Schools" underwent a huge expansion this year by adding 16 new schools to the program, bringing the current total to 24. Participating schools have indicated a high degree of success with the implementation.
- The Board assisted Eastern Health in producing the first edition of Living Healthy News which is a regional newsletter to provide school staff and Eastern Health staff with information regarding health promotion.
- On September 28, 2007 the majority of schools participated in the second annual Living Healthy Commotion. This event allows schools to celebrate what they are doing to make their school a healthier place to learn, work and play.



 The Board, in conjunction with the provincial government and Eastern Health has developed regional Living Healthy Resource Depots at District Office and each of the three regional offices. These depots provide schools with the opportunity to sign out a variety of healthy living resources to support their healthy living events and activities.

Student Events:

- The following represents some of the many student events held throughout the District:

Policy Development:

- The following policies were created and/or modified in 2007-08: Safe & Caring Schools, Bomb Threats, Weapons, Student Registration and Transfers, Guidance, Use of Instructional Time, Acceptable Use of Information & Communications Technology, Occupational Health and Safety, and Return to Work.
- Community Use of Schools policy and regulations were updated to reflect the new insurance coverage provided by government.
- Video Surveillance policy practices were modified to ensure ATIPP compliance with Access to Information and Protection of Privacy (ATIPP)
- ATIPP strategy was developed and approved by Planning and Priorities Committee of the Board.

Professional Development:

- The Programs Division provided professional development for all teachers during the four regional closeouts held in the fall of 2007. The theme of the closeouts was Professional Learning Communities — Caring, Connecting, and Collaborating which focused on assessment for learning.
- A continued focus on Mathematics included sessions on: developing
 - number concepts, geometry, using children's literature in the mathematics classroom, assessment for learning in the mathematics classroom, teaching through problem solving, differentiated instruction, the CAMET Assessment Resource, the role of concrete materials in mathematics learning and teaching, and rubric training. As well, all



schools were provided with two additional substitute days for each of their grade two, three, and four teachers to attend professional development sessions more specific to those grade levels.

- Numerous professional development sessions were conducted throughout the year, topics included:
 - o assessment for learning,
 - visual literacy,
 - o cross-curricular reading strategies,
 - o classroom management,
 - o media literacy,
 - o assistant principals' administrative training,
 - o Choices planner/career development,
 - o WHMIS.
 - o First Aid,

- o lab safety,
- o cooperative learning,
- o positive behavioural supports,
- o Focus on Bullying and Focus on Harassment,
- o safe and caring schools initiatives,
- o functional behavioural assessment,
- o and the "Achievement for All" program.
- Training was provided to all maintenance staff in the identification and first level remediation of mould and other indoor air contaminants.
- The District Human Resource Managers as well as the Director of HR have participated in several Lancaster audio conferences to enhance their knowledge and skills in human resource and labour relations best practices. Participation in these conferences will ensure the District is kept current on the leading policies, practices, and procedures in Human Resources and Labour Relations, and this in turn, will enhance the delivery of HR services to our employees and management personnel.
- Administrators were presented with multiple sessions on ATIPP, with a view to capacity building and knowledge sharing.

First Time Events:

 Teachers as Researchers into Mathematics: The Board, in partnership with the Department of Education, and the Primary/Elementary Special Interest Council of the Newfoundland and Labrador Teachers' Association, co-sponsored a professional development teacher research program that involved teachers inquiring into teacher learning, and the learning and teaching of mathematics.



- Intermediate Common Mathematics Assessments were created by District wide committees of teachers for Grades 7 and 8. Sample assessments were sent to schools in March and the final June assessments were written by approximately 83% of our schools. Common assessment question banks were also provided for all Grade 9 Mathematics units.
- The Junior High Math League expanded to include all regions of the District, with 30 schools participating.
- The first Student Support Services Team Building Day, centered on team building and networking, was held on April 25, 2008.

- District School staff hosted its first Friendship Friday where many students who have availed of support in the Mental Health unit over the years, and have since returned to the regular school system or graduated, returned to reconnect with their peers and teaching staff.
- The first Director's roundtable on K-12 Safe and Caring Schools initiatives was held on October 31, 2007. Community partners participating included the RNC, RCMP, Child Youth and Family Services, Women's Policy Office, and Regional Coordinating Coalition on Violence. The Board shared Safe and Caring Schools initiatives and encouraged further partnering in this area.
- In June, the first issue of a new Safety Newsletter was developed and distributed to all employees. This will become a regular feature to increase District awareness of occupational health and safety matters.
- Late French Immersion was offered in the Vista Region for the first time.
- The District participated in inaugural Provincial Education Privacy Committee, and implemented privacy reviews/audits in schools/offices.

New Programs:

- In March, 2008 the Minister of Education, as part of the Provincial Excellence in Mathematics Strategy, announced the implementation of a new mathematics curriculum from Kindergarten to Grade 12. All teachers in Grades K, 1, 4 and 7 received a two-day introduction to the new curriculum prior to school ending and an additional day is planned for the fall.
- The ISSP/Pathways Commission Report which was released December 18, 2007 contained many changes that will have a significant impact upon our students and teachers. For example, Pathways 2, Functional Behaviour Analysis (FBA) and Behaviour Management Plans (BMP) have been revised, and an online resource site of alternate courses and curriculum for teachers has been developed. Many more revisions and reviews related to this will be conducted in the coming year.
- A new physical education course, 3100/3101, was introduced and implemented in September, 2007 with a new textbook, Active for Life. The text features up to date information for students relating to physical education and healthy living. In addition to the new text, the Department of Education has also finalized a provincial assessment tool for physical education that can be used from K-12.



- Nutrition 2102/3102 was a new course that was implemented in September 2007 at the high school level.
- A new Core French program, including new resources and a new curriculum guide, was successfully implemented in grades eight and nine.
 Teachers are pleased to work with the new resource and second language teaching strategies proposed in the curriculum guide.

Funding:

- Approximately \$80,000,000 of major capital projects commenced work during this past year.
- In response to ongoing requests from Boards, government increased the funding allocation for repairs and maintenance to school districts. This is permitting the commencement of work to address maintenance items which have been deferred for a number of years.
- The Department of Education provided \$600,000 for small capital initiatives, in addition to regular operating grants and major capital funding. This funding helped the District complete certain small essential capital projects.
- Funding was made available in the 2007-08 budget for additional technical support. The Board directed this funding into the hiring of seven additional computer technicians.
- Through a Department of Education initiative, free textbooks were offered from K-LIII; previously parents paid for 9-LIII texts.
- The Board received funding for many projects under the provincial "Excellence in Mathematics" strategy. One hundred thousand dollars was received for mathematics promotion, \$10,000 for the "Research in Mathematics" project, \$70,000 for the intermediate research project, and \$50,000 for Mathematics Leadership. This funding has provided unprecedented opportunities for mathematics promotion, professional development and meaningful action research.
- The Board's inclusion program received \$6,000 to purchase resources to enhance the professional development that itinerants and program specialists can offer in the areas of differentiated instruction, universal design, and inclusion.
- The Department of Education provided \$20,000 to extend the Academic Pilot Project to St. Andrew's Elementary. As well, the Department of

- Education also provided an additional \$20,000 for English as Second Language resources for programming in the pilot project schools.
- The Cultural Connections initiative enabled the Board to develop a Fine Arts cost share program in partnership with the Department of Education to provide schools with nearly \$400,000 to purchase resources for their classroom and fine arts programs. Funding in the amount of \$20,000 was also provided through Learning Partners to promote professional development for teachers.
- The federal-provincial agreement for Official Languages in Education for Second Language instruction facilitated the implementation of several French Immersion and Intensive Core French programs as well as providing financial support for numerous projects to promote the maintenance and growth of French programs and provision of professional development for French teachers and administrators.



APPENDIX ONE - Legislated Mandate

Source: Schools Act, 1997

Duties of boards

75. (1) A board shall

- a). organize and administer primary, elementary and secondary education within the district;
- b). provide for the instruction of students either by the establishment of a program in its schools or by making an arrangement with another board or with another educational body in Canada;
- c). determine policy for the effective operation of primary, elementary and secondary schools in the district;
- d). ensure that policies and guidelines issued by the minister relating to special education for students are followed in schools under its jurisdiction;
- e). ensure adequate supervision of all students enrolled in its schools during the period for which the board is responsible for those students:
- f). develop a policy on employment equity and a plan for implementing the policy;
- g). appoint and dismiss employees;
- h). appoint and assign duties of teachers;
- i). adopt personnel policies which shall follow the personnel administration procedures of the government of the province, with the necessary changes, unless other policies are approved, in writing, by the minister;
- j). formulate policies for evaluating employees;
- k). arrange for the bonding of the assistant director of finance and administration and other persons employed by the board whose duties include the collecting, receiving or depositing of money belonging to the board;
- purchase or otherwise acquire, subject to the prior written approval of the minister, real property that it requires;

- m). ensure that those programs or courses of study, including courses in religious education, and the materials prescribed or approved by the minister are followed in the schools under its control;
- n). ensure that each school within its district maintains adequate program and performance standards;
- o). establish policies for student evaluation and student promotion;
- p). establish priorities for school construction, maintenance and repair and make recommendations to the minister;
- q). make known to the public and enlist the support of the public for board policies and programs;
- r). transmit to the minister all records and returns required by this Act and other reports and returns that the minister may require;
- s). where the board considers it necessary, arrange for a system of transportation of students to and from schools;
- t). where arrangements are made by it for the transportation of students, ensure that all vehicles engaged in carrying students to and from school are
 - i. in good mechanical condition,
 - ii.have adequate liability insurance, and
 - iii. that an appropriate bus safety program is offered to students who are transported by bus;
- insure and keep insured all its buildings and equipment and obtain insurance indemnifying it against liability in respect of a claim for damages or personal injury;
- v). admit, at all reasonable times and subject to the terms of an agreement between it and the Memorial University of Newfoundland, a student enrolled in the Faculty of Education or School of Physical Education and Athletics at that University to a school under its control for the purpose of observation and the practice of teaching;
- w). admit, at all reasonable times and subject to the terms of an agreement between it and a college or institute, a student enrolled in a training program for student assistants, to a school under its control for the purpose of observation and activities associated with a work term:

- x). organize and administer a school in an institution, where directed to do so by the minister;
- y). comply with a policy directive of the minister; and
- z). immediately inform the minister in writing of a vacancy in the position of director or assistant director.
- (2) Notwithstanding paragraph (1)(g), an emergency supply shall not be employed or appointed to teach without the permission of the minister.
- (3) A board shall be responsible to the minister for the expenditure of public funds, the conduct of programs of instruction, and evaluation required by the minister and for the maintenance of adequate program and performance standards in schools in the district.

Powers of boards

76. (1) A board may

- a). employ persons that the board considers necessary for its operations and to carry out its objects;
- b). enter into agreements for the purpose of carrying out its functions under this Act;
- c). permit a school building under its control to be used outside of school hours, where this does not interfere with the regular conduct of the school;
- d). assess a person or group a fee for use of a school under paragraph(c);
- e). require a student, believed by a teacher to be suffering from a communicable disease or a physical or mental condition which might endanger an employee of the board or other students, to be examined by a medical practitioner or other professional person appointed or approved by the board and, upon the recommendation of the medical practitioner or that other professional person, exclude that student from school until a certificate acceptable to the board is obtained from a medical practitioner or that other professional person permitting that student to return to school, but an exclusion or extension of an exclusion shall be reviewed by the board within 25 school days;
- f). by notice, in writing, require an employee or other person to undergo a physical examination by a medical practitioner appointed or approved by the board or a psychological examination by 2

- medical practitioners or 2 psychologists registered under the Psychologists Act and to submit a certificate acceptable to the board signed by the medical practitioners or psychologists setting out the conclusions regarding the physical or mental health of that employee or person;
- g). summarily dismiss an employee or other person who within 14 days from the date of receiving a notice under paragraph (f) has not made a reasonable attempt to obtain the examination;
- h). where a certificate submitted to a board under paragraph (f) shows that an employee or other person's physical or mental health would be injurious to an employee of the board or the students, direct the employee or other person to take sick leave or other earned leave or, where he or she has no sick leave or other earned leave or the sick leave or other earned leave is exhausted, require the employee or other person to take unpaid leave;
- suspend from work, with or without pay, an employee or other person who is charged with an offence that in the opinion of the board would make that employee or other person unsuitable to perform his or her duties;
- j). provide, subject to the written permission of the parent of the student concerned and in conjunction with the appropriate officials responsible for traffic control in the area, a system of school patrols in which a student may assist in the control of motor vehicle traffic on highways or elsewhere so far as the traffic may affect a student going to or from the school;
- k). raise money, subject to the prior written approval of the minister, upon its corporate credit and for the purpose of the board;
- I). sell or lease property for the purpose of the board, subject to the prior written approval of the minister;
- m). levy a fee for the transportation of students; and
- n). become a member of a provincial association of school boards and pay a required membership fee.
- (2) Notwithstanding section 75 or subsection (1) of this section, a board may close a school only after the parents of students affected have been given an opportunity to make representations to the board.

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AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board Members of: Eastern School District

I have audited the balance sheet of the current and capital funds of the Eastern School District as at June 30, 2008 and the related statements of current revenues, expenditures and District deficiency, cash flows and changes in capital fund for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the District's management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

The accounting policy with respect to Teachers' Severance Pay is described in Note 2. Canadian generally accepted accounting principles require that all accounts receivable should be recorded and disclosed on the financial statements. The liability for Teachers' Severance Pay has been recorded but no offsetting receivable has been recorded. In this respect, these financial statements are not in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. If the accounts receivable were recorded in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles, changes to the amounts reported for accounts receivable, revenue, and excess of expenditures over revenue would be necessary.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the failure to record accounts receivable as described in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Board as at June 30, 2008 and the results of its operations and changes in its capital financial position for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles and as explained in note 1 to the financial statements and are in compliance with reporting requirements established for School Boards in the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador by the Department of Education.

Nature of Operations

The Eastern School District is responsible for the operations and maintenance of all schools in the Eastern portion of the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador. The District was formed August 31, 2004 after the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador dissolved four previous boards known as Vista School District, Burin School District, Avalon West School District, and Avalon East School District.

These financial statements do not include school based financial activities which would consist of revenues, expenses and net assets controlled directly by school administration.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements have, in management's opinion, been properly prepared within reasonable limits of materiality and within the framework of accounting policies summarized below:

Fund Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on a fund accounting basis which is generally accepted for School Boards. Fund accounting can be defined as "accounting procedures in which a self balancing group of accounts is provided for each fund." It is customary for School Boards to account separately for the current and capital funds. These financial statements include both the current and capital funds on a combined basis.

Common Controlled Entities

The District currently excersises control over corporations known as the Eastern Education Foundation Inc. and Newfoundland International Student Exchange Program Inc.

The net assets of the Eastern Education Foundation Inc. as at March 31, 2008 were \$ 202,383 in accordance with the financial statments compiled by the corporation. These amounts have not been consolidated with the Districts financial statements as at June 30, 2008.

The net assets of the Newfoundland Student Exchange Program Inc. as at June 30, 2008 are recorded in note 7 (accounts payable) of these financial statements. Net funds generated from this Corporation are used for specific purposes and will be recognized as revenue in the District's financial statements when approved by the Management Committee of the Newfoundland Student Exchange Program Inc.

Revenue

The District's main source of funding is derived from the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador, Department of Education ("the Department"). The Department provides funding for operations, transportation, capital expenditures and teacher salaries and severance pay. Funding designated for specific purposes is deferred and included in revenue when the related expenditures have been incurred.

1. Significant Accounting Policies (Cont'd)

Capital Assets

Capital assets assumed by the District on August 31, 2004, as a result of legislation passed pursuant to the *Schools Act, 1997* and the *Education Act*, are recorded based on the Net Book Values shown on the audited financial statements of the predecessor entities. Deferred costs for the energy retrofit project are amortized on the straight-line basis over a period of seven years.

Beginning July 1, 2006 tangible capital assets will be amortized using the straightline basis over their estimated useful lives, using the following rates:

Buildings	50 years
Furniture and equipment	10 years
Service vehicles	5 years
Buses	12 years
Miscellaneous	5 years

Teachers' and Student Assistants' Payroll

The Government of Newfoundland and Labrador processes the payrolls and remits the source deductions directly to the appropriate agencies. The amounts recorded in the financial statements represent gross salaries for the year.

Pension Costs

All permanent employees of the District are covered by pension plans administered by the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador. Contributions to these plans are required from both the employee and the District. Post retirement obligations to employees are the responsibility of the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and, as such, the employer contributions for pensions and other retirement benefits are recognized in the accounts on a current basis.

Other Employee Severance Pay Accrual

The District records severance pay liability for employees other than teachers. Employees are entitled to one week of severance pay for each year of service to a maximum of twenty weeks once they reach 9 years of service with the District.

Use of Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenditures during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. Teachers' Severance Pay Benefits

Pursuant to a directive issued by the Department during fiscal 1998, the District recorded severance pay for teachers in the District. The *Schools Act, 1997* specifies that salaries and other compensation for teachers are the responsibility of the Department. The District received written approval from the Minister of Education for the deficit arising from the Department's requirement for the teachers' severance.

5. Teachers' Vacation Pay

Pursuant to a directive issued by the Department during the fiscal year 2006, the District recorded the vacation pay liability for teachers in the District. The liability relates to teachers' salaries earned during the school year but not fully paid to teachers until subsequent to June 30. Accordingly, the District has recorded teachers' vacation pay receivable of \$ 30,332,299 at June 30, 2008, (2007 - \$ 28,809,763).

6. Bank Indebtedness

The District had an authorized operating demand loan of \$4,000,000, bearing interest at Royal Bank prime less 0.65% which was unused as at June 30, 2008 and June 30, 2007. In accordance with the *Schools Act, 1997*, the operating demand loan was supported by a letter of approval to borrow provided by the Minister of Education.

10. Obligation Under Capital Leases

The District had entered into a capital lease with Royal Bank of Canada to finance its Energy Performance capital expenditures (EPC). The lease was for \$ 5,000,000 for 5 years including a purchase option of \$2,750,000 which expired May 2008. During June 2008, the purchase option was refinanced for a period of 5 years with a purchase option of \$1.

The District also entered into capital leases with the Royal Bank of Canada for various equipment purchases. The leases total \$ 1,176,917 as at June 30, 2008 with a purchase option of \$1.

11. Deferred Costs

A predecessor School Board entered into a sale lease contract with the Royal Bank of Canada for their Energy Performance contract. A gain of \$1,868,737 was recorded upon sale of these assets. This gain was amortized over sixty months. During the year \$ 342,603 (2007 - \$373,747) was recorded as amortization expense in the financial statements.

13. Financial Instruments

The carrying value of the Districts financial instruments, with the exception of long-term receivables, approximate fair values due to the short-term maturity and normal credit terms of those instruments. The long-term receivables balance does not approximate fair value as it is non-interest bearing.

14.Insurance Subsidy

The cost of insuring school properties is borne by the Provincial Government and no amount has been recorded in these accounts to reflect this cost.

15.Unrealized Gain on Sale of Investments

This represents an unrecognized gain on investments held by a predecessor District. This amount was recognized as an asset in 2007.

16. Contingent Liabilities

Site restoration and remediation costs associated with school properties under the District are charged to operations as incurred. Estimated future site restoration and remediation costs have not been accrued in these financial statements since the obligation, if any, is presently not determinable. Such costs are normally funded by the Province.

The Board has a potential liability for accumulated sick leave to its employees in the amount of \$12,395,000. This amount has not been included in the financial statements. The amount is calculated based on Board policy and on an interpretation of the agreement with unionized employees. Any payments to employees for sick leave is expensed in the period such payments are incurred.

17. Comparative Figures

Certain of the 2007 amounts have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted for 2008.
